TELLS OF ALASKA ROADS PROGRAM

Seattle, April 19.—Col. W. P. Richardson, chairman of the Alaskan Road Commission, who has been in Washington, D. C., for the winter, arrived in this city yesterday and is registered at the Seattle en route to Valdez, the Alaskan headquarters of the commission. Among the plans for the coming summer are included the building of a bridge across the Chena Slough at Fairbanks, and the probable replacing of the bridge at Nome, destroyed by a storm two years ago. Other plans of the commission call for the repairing and maintenance of present roads in the North, with special attention to be paid to the Fairbanks-Valdez road.

Colonel Richardson deplores the fact that the appropriations for road work in Alaska are so small. "The total fund is very inadequate," he said last night. "The special appropriation made by Congress is but \$165,000, to which will be added in the neighborhood of \$100,000 from the Alaska fund."

CANADIANS AGAIN ENGAGED IN BATTLE

Ottawa, April 23.—It is believed here from unofficial intelligence received that the Canadians have been again engaged in the heavy fighting which figures in the British official reports in the vicinity of Ypres.

Since the Neuve Chappelle engagements the Canadians have been resting in their part of the battlefield, and the casualty lists have been comparatively light.

It is hinted, however, that the force suffered some losses in the recent fighting south of Ypres, in which they are said to have been engaged. Official confirmation of these reports is expected at any time.

REPUBLICAN SUCCESS PREDICTED BY JUDGE

Washington, April 22.—Judge Thomas Burke, of Seattle, is quoted in an interview in the Washington Post yesterday as saying that he would not be a candidate for the United States Senate next year.

The Post interview quotes Judge Burke as expressing preference for Elihu Root for the presidential nomination. He speaks highly of Justice Hughes, but says the highest court of the land should not be disturbed for political reasons.

Further, the judge asserted that whatever Republican is nominated will be elected, "for the entire country is tired of Democratic control." He declared also that "there is no more progressive party in the state of Washington."

SQUATTERS AT SEWARD TO FIGHT FOR CLAIMS

Seward, Alaska, April 23.—Rumors that the Alaska Engineering Commission had decided to throw open to settlement the sixty-acre terminal tract here, acquired by the government with the purchase of the Alaska Northern Railroad, caused a stampede of squatters, who have occupied almost all of the tract.

Many prominent business men and several women are among the squatters, who have armed themselves with rifles to prevent claim jumping. There have been several minor quarrels, but as yet no one has been hurt.

Planned to Use Land for Camp.

United States District Judge Fred M. Brown had planned to obtain the use of this tract as a temporary camp for the hundreds of men who are hurrying to Seward from all parts of Alaska and from the States as a result of the announcement that Seward would be the tidewater terminus of the government railroad to Fair-

Deputy United States Attorney Whiteley said that the land belongs to the Alaska Northern until the sale of the road to the government is completed by the payment, July 1, of the first \$500,000 on the \$1,500,000 purchase price. Mr. Whiteley said he would not interfere with the squatters unless the railroad company files a complaint of trespass.

First Lot Staked by B. R. Laberee.

The rush to seize claims on the terminal tract began yesterday morning. The first lot was staked by B. R. Laberee, son of the former received of the Alaska Northern. Despite a snow storm, which has blanketed Seward, the stampede continued, and squatters were busy setting up tents and clearing their lots.

SIR RICHARD'S VISIT DOESN'T HELP STOCK

Vancouver, April 23.—"The feeling in Canadian Pacific was good but Canadian Northern were heavy on the debenture default." Such was the statement cabled to the Montreal Herald on April 14 from London, England. In other words, the market in the financial metropolis of the world is not favorable to Canadian Northern stock for which British Columbia is standing sponsor. The item of news was sent out by the Central News Agency, one of the most reliable in the Old Country, and it may therefore be accepted as quite correct. The visit of Sir Richard McBride to England may not be disconnected with this condition. Since that date no further statement as to the standing of Canadian Northern on the London market has reached this part of Canada.
