# LOOTING OF BRITISH COLUMBIA AND THE INEVITABLE RESULTS

TORONTO GLOBE HAS IMPORTANT ARTICLE SHOWING THAT IN SPITE OF NATURAL WEALTH OF THIS PROVINCE DEVELOPMENT HARDLY STARTED.

The people of British Columbia are beginning to ask themselves how it comes that in a province so rich as theirs men and women eager to work are denied the opportunity, and find it necessary to riot in the streets that they may draw the attention of the authorities to their condition. Nowhere else on the face of the earth today have a half-million people such a vast heritage of natural wealth. The forests are the wonder of all who see them. The fisheries are productive beyond the dreams of the fishermen of the Atlantic seaboard. The mines are already world-famous, although the mineralized territory has scarcely been scratched. The fertility of the soil of British Columbia is proverbial. Agricultural land is not found in large areas—as in the Prairie Provinces—awaiting the plow. Clearing is a slow and costly operation. But it is the testimony of everyone who has used the land for productive purposes that soil and climate combine to produce fruit, garden truck, fodder, and most cereals of the very highest quality and in great profusion.

And yet, with all this natural wealth awaiting the hands of the industrious, there are thousands of unemployed in Vancouver and other cities. Why is it? Partly because the recent real estate boom carried almost the entire population of the Pacific Coast cities off their feet, but in an even greater degree because the natural resources of the province have been locked up by speculative exploiters in a way that would have disgraced the rule of a South American dictator. The man who seeks for land convenient to transportation facilities and a consuming market with the expectation of using it for productive purposes speedily discovers that the trail of the exploiter is to be found in every corner of the province.

The Victoria Times is letting daylight in upon the operations of those who, under the law and in a strictly constitutional way, have robbed the people of British Columbia of their heritage. During the single week ending October 3, 1912, The Provincial Gazette shows that applications were made for the purchase under the pre-emption law of 464,995 acres of land. The great bulk of this land was wanted not for use, but for speculative purposes. The pre-emptors were in many cases well known as agents of land companies which took advantage of the law to secure at nominal prices great tracts of territory with the intention of making the actual settler pay a big price. During the week of which The Times speaks married women applied for 48,402 acres, spinsters for 36,490, and widows for 10,569. Clerks and stenographers applied for 40,065 acres, but they were outclassed by industrial workers, who applied for 93,760 acres. Merchants and manufacturers were desirous of acquiring

54,266 acres; professional men, 49,991 acres; real estate agents and brokers, 34,955 acres; laborers, most in the cities, 34,079 acres. Farmers and ranchers were down for 24,079 acres. According to the same issue of The Gazette, James Scott staked 74,040 acres and Robert Cross 62,080 acres. These applicants were encouraged in their applications by the virtual suspension of the provision of the law limiting the area that could be held by any one person to 640 acres, the contravention of which has been for years a "recognized practice."

Everybody was gambling in wild lands, and naturally the government which ran the table and paid over the winnings with alacrity was popular. Now all is changed. The people of British Columbia have discovered that when few are buyers and practically everybody is selling the holding of land for speculative purposes is not a very profitable form of gambling. They begin to understand that the land must be brought into use before it can add to the wealth of the province and provide daily bread for the workers. Everything points to a drastic change in the laws of the province and the cancellation of the titles to millions of acres obtained by methods that will not bear examination. The looting of British Columbia nears an end. The day of restitution approaches.—Toronto Globe.

### PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Department of Lands—Water Rights Branch.

#### CERTIFICATE OF APPROVAL.

1. WHEREAS the Corporation of the City of Prince Rupert is incorporated under an Act entitled the "City of Prince Rupert Incorporation Act, 1910,"—B. C. Statutes 1910, Chapter 41:

2. AND, WHEREAS, by Resolution of the Council of the said Corporation authority was given to stake water rights on the North Arm of Wark Channel:

3. AND, WHEREAS, the said Corporation has applied for a water licence to divert water from Thulme River, a tributary of the said North Arm, for power purpose:

4. AND, WHEREAS, the said Corporation has, after due notice, petitioned for the approval of its undertaking as far as it relates to the said application for a licence:

5. AND, WHEREAS, no objection has been filed to the said petition:

6. THIS IS TO CERTIFY that the undertaking of the said Corporation in so far as it relates to the said application for a licence is approved, subject to the terms and conditions of the "Water Act, 1914," and to the following additional terms and conditions:

7. Any licence issued under said application shall, notwithstanding the issue of this certificate, be subject to adjustment by the Board of Investigation:

8. The said undertaking has been divided into two parts, the first part consisting of the surveys of such of the works proposed in the said application for a licence as the Comptroller of Water Rights shall consider necessary, and the second part consisting of the construction, maintenance, and operation of such works.

9. The surveys required under the first part shall be commenced on or before the 1st day of June, 1915, and the plans thereof shall be deposited with the Comptroller of Water Rights on or before the 1st day of November, 1917.

10. The second part of the undertaking shall not be commenced until a bylaw under the provisions of which the said Corporation propose to carry out the undertaking has been duly passed and approved, nor until a further certificate of approval under Section 83 of the "Water Act, 1914," has been issued.

11. The territory within which the said Corporation shall exercise its powers in respect of the use of the said water is the City of Prince Rupert.

12. This certificate shall not in any way be deemed to be an approval of the plans of any works covered by the proposed undertaking or to authorize the construction of such works, but shall have the effect only of a certificate issued under the provisions of Section 81 of the "Water Act, 1914," and shall be subject to such provisions, and to the rights of the Continental Power Company under an application filed on the 18th day of August, 1908.

13. This certificate shall become null and void without any notice unless a further certificate as required by Clause 10 hereof be applied for before the 1st day of June, 1917.
