> General French's report today says: "All the German attacks yesterday at Ypres were repulsed. In the afternoon our troops took the offensive and made progress in the vicinity of St. Julienne. The French co-operated and retook Het Sas. Our artillery inflicted severe casualties on the enemy. In addition to destroying the Courtrai station, our airmen bombarded the stations at Tourcoing, Roubaix, Inglemunster, Statedn, Langemarck, Thielt and Roulois."

The Belgian official report says that their infantry repelled three attacks of the Germans at Dixmude. The Germans used gas here as elsewhere.
