DURATION OF THE WAR.

The question uppermost in the mind of the civilized world today is, "When will the war end?" Every business man is planning for the future, and in every plan this vital question crops up.

The Literary Digest has asked this question of the editors of the leading newspapers in France, Germany, Austria, Russia, and Britain. Many answers have been received, and The Digest publishes a selection of them in its May issue.

All are more or less vague, but few venture to predict a settlement in 1915. In each case there is expression of a deep-rooted determination to see the thing through to the end.

In Germany, there is a disinclination to discuss the subject, chiefly because such discussion is not looked upon with approval by the military. The sentiment of Berlin is that "the war will last until our enemies have suffered a defeat which will insure us against further breaches of the peace, and it must give us such a peace that we can unfold our German character and strength as a free people."
