REINFORCEMENTS FOR PRINCESS PATRICIAS

The following is a copy of the announcement that is being issued with the organization of the Second University Company which is going to the front shortly as a reinforcement to the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry:

SECOND UNIVERSITY COMPY.
(Canadian Expeditionary Force)
Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

The Canadian Militia Department has authorized the organization of a Second University Company for Overseas Service, to go as a reinforcement to the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. The company will be commanded by Capt. Geo. C. McDonald, of the McGill Contingent, C.O.T.C., with Capt. Percival Molson, also of the McGill C.O.T.C., as second in command.

Owing to the success which has attended the recruiting for the First University Company, which is at present up to full strength, and attached as "D" Company to the 38th Battalion, Canadian Expeditionary Force, it was thought advisable to form another company, and an application was made to the department for the necessary authority, which has been granted.

Recruiting for the company has already been started, and many names have been received.

The company will be composed of graduates or undergraduates of universities or their friends.

Conditions of service and rate of pay will be the same as in the other units of the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

The First University Company and the Toronto University and McGill University Contingents, C.O.T.C., are going to a training camp at Niagara-on-the-Lake on May 3rd to the 15th, and it is expected that during that period a large number of recruits for the new company will be obtained.

Immediately after the camp active recruiting will be commenced at Montreal.

The headquarters of the company will be at 382 Sherbrooke Street West, and any enquiries or applications should be addressed there to Lieut. Geo. S. Currie, recruiting officer.

IN THE LETTER BOX

Editor, The Daily News:

Dear Sir,—In The Journal of the 14th inst. an article appears as copied from The Mail and Empire headed, "Predicts an Election," which is so unfair and at variance with the facts that it is impossible to allow this statement to go unchallenged. The statement is made that the Liberals opposed the method of raising war revenues and generally pursued a policy of obstruction in the prosecution of the war. Such statement is not a statement of fact, as the Liberals have given their unanimous endorsement to every proposition of the government to carry on the war. The Liberals have objected to the shameful and criminal action of the Tory party in the disgraceful and humiliating grafting in regard to the boots, bandages, horses, motor trucks, binoculars, and patent shovels supplied to the army of Canada. The purchase of the submarines has not yet been cleared up but we will learn more of this later.

The loyal and flag-waving Tory party is shown in its characteristic attitude in this crisis, accusing their opponents of disloyalty, while they themselves wave the flag and plunder the treasury.

The patriots who sold the bad

boots to the Canadian soldiers should be placed in front of a wall and face a firing squad. These are the gentlemen who boast of their loyalty; and every man who stands in the way of their mad rush to the cash box of the country is branded as a traitor to Canada.

The Liberals are in this fight just as much as any one else and in times like these party politics should disappear, but just so long as the Tory party insists that the Liberals are unpatriotic when they are defending the country from the plundering grafter, just so long will the fight keep up.

The so-called war taxes which have been levied on the country are in no sense of the word for war purposes but are levied to make up the financial deficit which is solely due to the carnival of extravagance prevailing at Ottawa. Since the Borden government came into office, they dismissed 13,466 public servants and replaced them with 25,613 servants. This extra expense has to be provided for; and the \$95,000 postoffice graft right here in Prince Rupert has to be paid for by so-called war taxes.
