## BRILLIANT ADVANCE OF BRITISH IN FRANCE

### FRENCH AVIATORS' DEADLY WORK--ZEPPELIN RAID FAILS--REBELS TAKE LISBON

#### LISBON TAKEN BY REBELS-- NEW GOVERNMENT FORMED

**FRENCH MAKE PROGRESS AND TAKE PRISONERS -- FRENCH AVIATORS DO DEADLY WORK--GERMAN ZEPPELINS MAKE FUTILE ATTACK ON SOUTH OF ENGLAND.**

London, May 17.—(Official)—The First British army made a successful attack near Festubert, breaking the enemy's line on a two-mile front. The attack commenced at midnight and we advanced one mile. The fighting continues in our favor.

**French Successes.**  
Paris, May 17.—(Official)—Progress continues in Hot Sas district. We have captured five German lines, 157 prisoners and four machine guns. Counter attacks by the enemy were a complete failure. At Oise we captured a Turkish flag which was saved from the trenches. The

total captures at Carency were over 2,000.

**French Aviators Busy.**  
Amsterdam, May 17.—French aviators destroyed a chemical factory at Launethal, near Danzig, causing a loss of \$75,000, and also destroyed seven sheds at Koenigsburg. Tanneries worth \$2,000,000 were also destroyed at Strassburg.

**German Air Raid.**  
London, May 17.—A German air raid on Ramsgate caused the death of one woman. Angle guns protected Dover. Zeppelins dropped incendiary bombs on Deal and Margate, with no damage reported, and five more were sighted north of Freeland.



**SITUATION IN WESTERN GALICIA.**

An important Austro-German success has been gained in Western Galicia which may compel the Russians to evacuate the Dukla Pass. Russian statements discount Austrian claims.

#### BRILLIANT BRITISH ADVANCE-- MILE GAINED NEAR FESTUBERT

**REBELS SET FIRE TO PARTS OF LISBON AND TAKE CITY--  
6,000 ARMENIANS MASSACRED--TRIESTE REVOLUTION--ITALY DECIDES TODAY.**

Lisbon, Portugal, May 17.—Lisbon has been taken by the rebels, and the government is in new hands. The city yielded after a revolutionary army of 3,000 threatened to storm the city. Shells from the fleet, which is in rebel hands, set the city on fire in three places. Joao Chagas is the new President. Many Royalists have been arrested.

**Armenians Arming.**  
London, May 15.—Six thousand Armenians were massacred at Van, in Armenia, on May 15. The Armenians are arming against the Turks and Kurds.

**Trieste Revolution.**  
Rome, May 17.—There has been

a revolution at Trieste, composed chiefly of women. The Austrian flag and a portrait of Francis Joseph were burned. Gendarmes killed 47 and wounded 300.

**Italy to Decide Today.**  
Rome, May 17.—King Victor Emmanuel has refused to accept Premier Salandra's resignation. The Cabinet will meet today, when it is expected that a policy of peace or war will be decided upon.

#### LINERS ARRIVE SAFELY.

#### MR. ALBERT PURCHASES WESTHOLME THEATRE

Mr. M. Albert, who owns the Westholme Theatre building, has purchased the entire equipment from the old company, and in future will conduct a first-class playhouse entirely of his own.

Because of a growing sentiment against anything owned and run by a people of German origin, the old company thought it advisable to dispose of their business. Mr. Albert assures the public that the members of the old company have not only disposed of their interest here, but will leave the city within the next few days.

The theatre will be closed tonight and tomorrow to allow the new owner to arrange for a new picture service and a new staff. Mr. Albert is a naturalized Briton of Russian birth. Not only is he by birth connected with one of our great allies, but he has no more than four brothers and thirteen other kinsmen in the world.

The new management will provide a show quite up to the best ever seen here. If present arrangements carry, the grand opening will take place on Wednesday evening first.

#### IMPRESSIVE SERVICE IN ANGLICAN CHURCH

In the Anglican Church yesterday, the Rev. Canon Rix conducted a special service in memory of the local boys who recently died in Belgium. The church was decorated with crosses and wreaths composed of Rupert mosses and wild flowers, while the Union Jack draped the western wall. The 68th Earl Greys and the Irish Fusiliers turned out in force.

At the outset of his discourse, Canon Rix described the call of the lion to her whelps to come to her side to fight for justice and for right, and how the world had witnessed a most wonderful response to the call. After making fitting reference to the sterling qualities of the Prince Rupert men who have fallen in the fray, he went on to describe the battle of Langemarck as one which shall live with Cressy, Agincourt and Balaclava, and how the story of the bravery of the men of Canada will ring down the century.

Addressed largely to men and soldiers, the preacher described the soldier's death as a triumphant passing into immortality, and patriotism as the next thing to the worship of God. "Life can not always be reckoned in years, but in the great things done and experienced; an honorable death for King and Empire is much more than long years of heedless, thoughtless, careless life," said the preacher, in effect.

The Canon called upon all to ask themselves, in their hearts, if they are worthy of the great and noble sacrifice made for them. The whole trend of the sermon was one of manliness, rather than of mourning; a call to a more serious estimation of the big realities of life.

At the close, the congregation sang the National Anthem, and remained standing while the organist played the "Dead March in Saul," followed by the sounding of the "Last Post" by the bugler of the Irish Fusiliers. It was a most impressive and inspiring service, peculiarly fitting to the occasion.

#### NEW RULING ON COPPER SHIPMENTS

In order to prevent copper being shipped to our enemies, the government has put into effect a rule providing that no copper, which is 90 per cent pure or over, is to be shipped from Canada to the United States, without proof of its final destination and the use to which it is to be put.

The ruling will affect the Granby company, with the others, but is not likely to interrupt their shipping of refined metal in any way. A recent shipment of 450 tons for Seattle has been switched to Vancouver, where the company's officers will be able to furnish the customs with the necessary details.

#### RED CROSS MAKES AN URGENT APPEAL

A call has come which must be answered. The hospitals of Europe are full of gallant Canadian boys, who are suffering for the Empire. There is an urgent call for additional funds with which to purchase bandages, dressings, splints, and other needs which require immediate attention.

Unless more funds are forthcoming, some of the hospitals will have to be closed. The Red Cross burden is enormous now, and with the extended summer campaign it will rapidly increase. Every cent contributed will help to alleviate the sufferings of the wounded, and the following table will show how much even one cent will do:

- \* 1 cent will buy iodine to disinfect wound.
- \* 1 cent will buy gauze for one dressing.
- \* 5 cents will buy a bandage.
- \* 8 cents will pay for a temporary splint.
- \* 10 cents will buy chloroform for an operation.
- \* 25 cents expended as above may save a life or limb.
- \* \$2.40 will pay for 100 yards of gauze.
- \* \$19 will buy 100 pounds of absorbent cotton.
- \* \$21 will pay for 1,000 sterilized bandages.
- \* \$40 will pay for 100 pounds of chloroform.
- \* \$60 will provide a nurse for a month.
- \* \$166.66 will provide a surgeon for one month.

The Daughters of the Empire will make a collection in aid of the Red Cross Fund on Saturday, May 22, when the people of Prince Rupert will have another opportunity of showing their loyalty to the boys on the firing line.

#### NEW OPERA HOUSE FOR PRINCE RUPERT

Mr. F. W. Hart, the well known old-timer of this city, has everything in shape for the construction of an up-to-date opera house behind the Hart Block.

The building, which will be of the latest clam shell type, will occupy a space of 50x100 feet and will seat about 1,000 people. The clamshell idea gives an auditorium of a wide crescent shape, which enables every one of the audience to see every corner of the house, as well as have an uninterrupted view of the stage. The entrance and exits are to be so arranged that parties entering or leaving will not disturb the rest of the audience in the slightest.

The entrance lobby will be where the London Grill is now and the exits will open on Fifth Street. The London Grill will be provided with more commodious premises in the same building.

Mr. Hart is an old hand at the game, having opened the first opera house in Vancouver, and also the first in Rossland, B. C. The old Hart Opera House in Vancouver seated 1,000 people.

Mr. J. H. Pillsbury is busy surveying for the excavation work and Mr. J. W. Potter is co-operating.
