GERMAN-CANADIANS SEEK NATURALIZATION

Ottawa, May 20.—Strangely enough, the bulk of the applications being received at the Secretary of State's office for naturalization under the new Imperial Naturalization Act are from Germans who have taken out Canadian naturalization papers previously. Evidently the applicants are anxious to get rid of the appellation, "German - Canadian," and to be classed as British subjects. For the present there is no inclination on the part of Parliament to grant original applications in the case of men of alien enemy origin, and it is expected that the applications will be held up for some time at least. The Lusitania horror has not increased the inclination to grant such applications.

So far the courts differ widely on the question of granting British naturalization to men of alien enemy origin. Chief Justice Meredith holds that the act is in abeyance so far as the latter are concerned for the duration of the war. Chief Justice Archambault, of Quebec, holds a different view. He declares that by virtue of two proclamations dealing with people of alien enemy origin in the Act is enforced for those not registered or interned.

The first proclamation, issued on August 15, grants the same rights to men of alien origin who behave themselves, the same right as British subjects. The second proclamation, issued on October 28, declares that men who are registered or interned shall not have the same right as British subjects. The implication, the Chief Justice holds, is that those who are not registered or interned shall have the right. Chief Justice Harvey, of Alberta, holds that the finding of the famous case of Lynch, who went over to the Boers in the South African war, and who was adjudged guilty of treason for having changed his nationality in time of war, applies here. He declares that for Canada to naturalize Germans would be conniving at treason. These conflicting judgments cannot, of course, weigh with the department. Still, in view of present circumstances, no applicants of alien enemy origin will have their application concurred in.

The certificates are not yet prepared, and only a limited number of applications have been granted. These are men who desire to travel. In their case temporary certificates are granted.

BOSTONIANS HERE FOR TWO NIGHTS ONLY

As ever welcome as the flowers in May are the Juvenile Bostonians, and the announcement that they are to appear here for two nights only at The Westholme on Monday and Tuesday evening will be read with pleasure by all. Of all the theatrical organizations visiting here from time to time they are the most welcome. There are some new juveniles with them, but nearly all the old favorites, and they have several new musical operas added to their repertoire, with new costumes and elaborate stage settings. These later musical comedies are said to be full of the most tuneful music and each has a number that will be hummed and whistled long after the company has gone. In "Fantana" there is "Just My Style," which is irresistibly funny, and in "Tipperary Mary" there is the famous "Tipperary Trot," that will temporarily banish the horrors of war and place all the listeners on a peace footing. they loved at one time and whom they hate now for no other reason than that she bears a German name?

Fortunately, I am named with a Russian name, for I was born in Russia, and I am proud of having the honor of calling myself a British subject today.
