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## FRENCH AIRMEN MAKE SUCCESSFUL RAID

### VANCOUVER EDITOR ARRESTED—ZEPPELIN RAID ON SOUTHEND, WOMAN KILLED

#### FRENCH AVIATORS ATTACK GERMAN EXPLOSIVE WORKS

ARMY OF FRENCH AEROPLANES DROP BOMBS ON CHEMICAL FACTORY—MANY BUILDINGS FIRED—ANOTHER AT OSTEND—ZEPPELIN KILLS WOMAN.

May 27.—A French army of eighteen aeroplanes dropped bombs on a chemical factory at Ostend, on the Rhine. This is the most important explosive factory in the world. Each plane dropped hundreds of projectiles and set many of the factory buildings on fire. The aviators were in the air for six hours.

At Ostend, May 27.—Fifty

German soldiers were killed in a street car in Ostend, when one of the Allies' aviators dropped a bomb. The railroad station and the harbor were damaged in the aerial attack.

#### The Difference.

Southend, Eng., May 27.—Another Zeppelin raid was made last night. Mrs. May Fabin, a visitor, was killed and several were injured. The damage done was slight. Two of the Zeppelins dropped incendiary bombs.

#### FRENCH CABLES TO PREMIER BORDEN

#### MANITOBA FARMERS TO GET SQUARE DEAL

Winnipeg, May 27.—In its new administration, the Manitoba Department of Agriculture is issuing a statement of work for the coming year. The administration policy is summarized as follows:

"Sincere and constant effort to improve agricultural conditions throughout the province will be the mainspring of the department's activities at all times. Manitoba is essentially an agricultural province and there is no other province in Canada where the business of farming can be carried on to greater advantage. We have wealth of soil, breadth of acres, an ideal climate and big market opportunities. It only remains for us to see that our farmers get a square deal. By practical common sense methods in meeting their difficulties and by wise legislation on their behalf it will be our endeavor to encourage a great forward movement along all lines of agricultural pursuits. The increased prosperity of Manitoba farmers will mean a corresponding increase in the general prosperity of our province."

#### MORE AMERICAN SCHOONERS ARRIVE

Today, the Sitka brought in 60,000 pounds and the Polaris 35,000. The Rainier and the Sitka are here for the second time.

#### BRITISH SUBMARINE ATTACK IN SIGHT OF CONSTANTINOPLE

BRITISH SUBMARINE SINKS TURKISH GUNBOAT—THE RECENT LOSSES CAUSE DEPRESSION IN CONSTANTINOPLE  
—H. M. S. TRIUMPH TORPEDOED AND SUNK.

Paris, May 27.—A British submarine has sunk a Turkish gunboat within sight of Constantinople. This loss, following the sinking of several transports recently, has caused a deep impression in Constantinople.

#### H. M. S. Triumph Sunk.

London, May 27.—The British battleship Triumph has been torpedoed and sunk in the Dardanelles while supporting the land

operations of the Australians and New Zealanders. Most of the officers and crew were saved.

H. M. S. Triumph was built in 1904 and was a first class battleship of the 19-knot Swiftsure class. She had a displacement of 11,985 tons and 12,500 horsepower. Her armament consisted of four 10-inch guns, 14 7.5-inch, fourteen 14-pounders, two 12-pounders, eight 6-pounders and machine guns and two torpedo tubes.

#### BOARD OF TRADE WAR RESOLUTIONS

The Board of Trade held a special meeting last night, when the two following resolutions were passed:

It was proposed by G. R. Naden and seconded by W. P. Lynch that:

"The Prince Rupert Board of Trade, in general meeting assembled, hereby assures the government of the Dominion of Canada, that they are behind them in the prosecution of the war to a successful conclusion to the last man and the last dollar."

On a vote being put to the meeting, this resolution was carried unanimously.

It was proposed by D. H. Hays and seconded by S. Parker that:

"The congratulations of the Prince Rupert Board of Trade be tendered the officers and members of the Canadian Expeditionary forces, who have so ably and dearly upheld the honor of the Dominion of Canada on the fields of battle in Europe, and that the Prince Rupert Board of Trade express their sincere regrets, that such severe losses were suffered by the members in so doing."
