The Colonel Drake arrived yesterday afternoon with a cargo of 40,000 barrels of crude oil for the Imperial Oil Company.

Mr. Gorman and Mr. Smithers, of the Booth Fisheries, bought a car of fresh fish this morning for shipment east.

The City of Seattle will bring along the first big Alaskan excursion party of the season. They will spend an hour in town if the boat arrives early enough.

FOOTBALL.

Under league auspices, the Sons of England and Drydock teams met on the Recreation grounds last night before an exceptionally large gathering of spectators, who must have been thoroughly pleased with the game, as the play throughout was full of exciting incidents. The teams appeared as advertised except that Campbell deputized for Dixon at centre-half for the ironworkers. The Drydock team made a promising start, scoring in the first minute of the game, but their early lead was soon lost through forceful play by the Englishmen, who notched two points in quick succession. During the attack on the Drydock citadel, Grant, their custodian, received an injury to his knee which necessitated his withdrawal from the game, Wright taking his place. Notwithstanding their handicap, the Drydock played well and were rewarded soon afterwards by Craggs, the English keeper, giving them a gift of a goal, while a little later Neilson scored a beauty from the penalty line. The score at half-time stood at 3 goals to 2 in favor of the Drydock. Play in the second half was even keener than in the opening period, with the Englishmen determined to improve their position, but they must have been disappointed when Jones put the Drydock still farther ahead. At this point A. Hardy took up the centre position and this certainly made for improvement. With twenty minutes gone, they got their third point, and indeed looked like equalizing at any moment. This they did after Woods had given away a corner, for Darton placed the kick so well that it was easy for Hardy to put the ball in the net. Excitement was now intense, with both teams striving hard to take the lead, but the Eng-

lishmen, showing more method, always looked the more dangerous. With but three minutes to go the score still remained 4 all, but Woods, who had been indulging in rather foolishly giving away corner kicks, again gave his opponents the opportunity they wanted, and the time Hardy gave the Englishmen another point, heading Darton's kick into the net, and thus the Englishmen retired worthy winners of the best game of this season.

Best for the winners were Darton, Garnet, Yardley and the Brothers Hardy, while on the Drydock side, Campbell, Jones, Winsby and McWilliams were best.

A Kinghorn made his initial appearance as a referee and with a little more practice may come along all right.

The next game takes place on Monday night, when last year's great rivals, the Callies and the Merchants, meet for the first time this season.

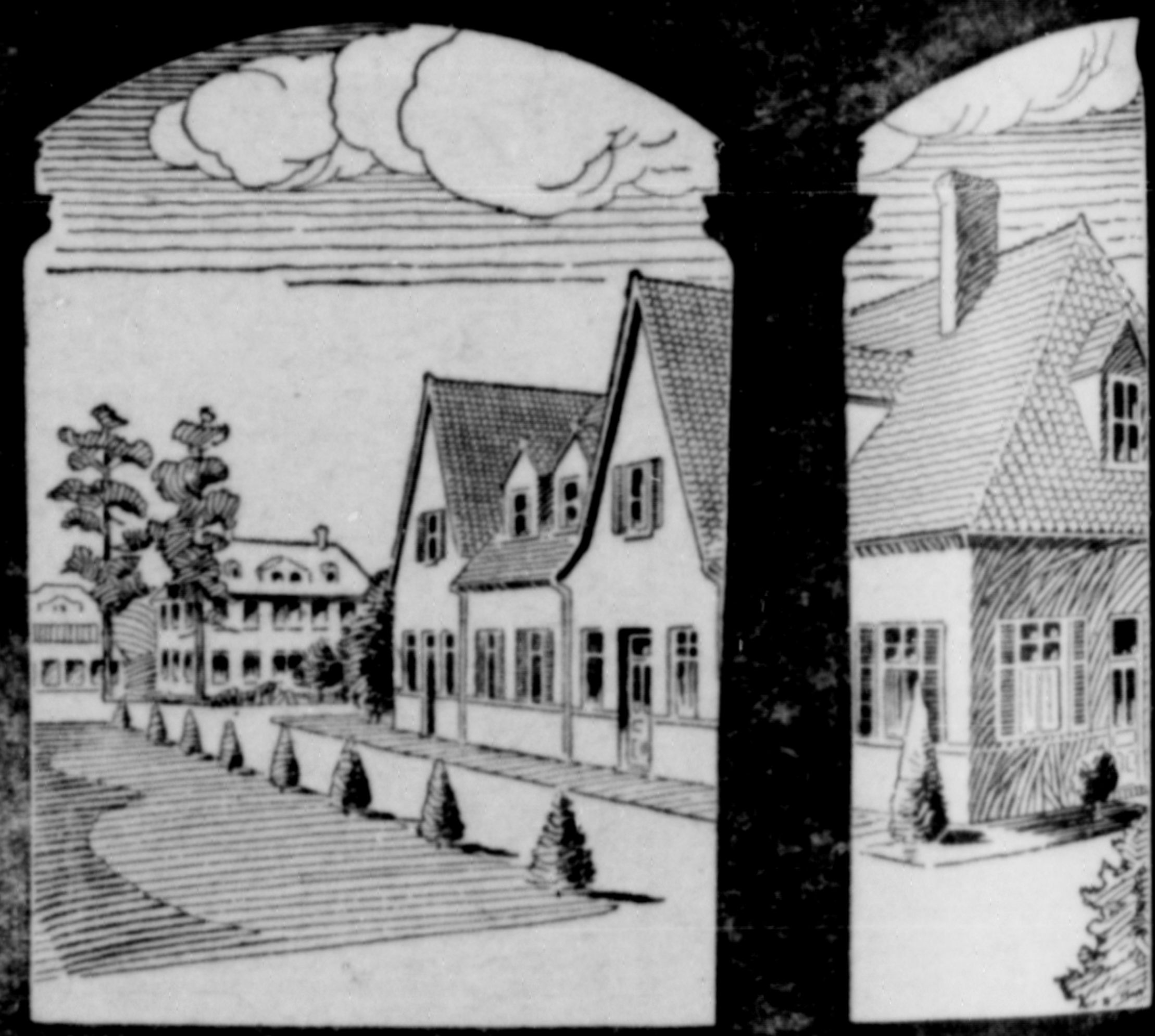
