PRESIDENT WILSON'S NOTE LEAVES TODAY--DISASTROUS FIRE AT PORTLAND

DISASTROUS MIDNIGHT FIRE AT PORTLAND ROSE FESTIVAL

**FIVE BLOCKS DESTROYED ALONG WATERFRONT — \$300,000
DAMAGE DONE—TWENTY-THREE FIRE COMPANIES
AND TWO FIREBOATS FIGHT THE
ROARING FLAMES.**

Portland, Ore., June 9.—The
fifth annual Rose Festival here
today was the scene of a disas-
trous midnight fire which de-
stroyed five blocks along the wa-
terfront south of the east approach
to Burnside bridge. The damage
will amount to \$300,000. The
heaviest sufferer is the Standard

Box and Lumber Company, with a
loss of \$250,000.

Twenty-two fire companies and
two fireboats were engaged in
fighting the spectacular fire.

A sunrise salute fired from the
cruiser Boston opened the Rose
Festival, which is to last for three
days.

CALGARY DETACHMENT CHASED BY SUBMARINES

The liner carrying the last de-
tachment of Calgarians destined
to form part of the Army Service
Corps for the second Canadian
contingent was chased by two
submarines off the south coast of
Ireland, and was actually reported
lost at Liverpool, according to the
information contained in a letter
from Sydney Judge, of Calgary.
The following is an extract from
the letter:

"Arrived at Shorncliffe, O. K.
We had a very good trip, except
that we had a narrow escape off
the south of Ireland. We sighted
two German submarines, but they
were behind us, and we beat them
for speed, and got away O. K.

"If they had been in front of
us when we sighted them, the
chances are we should now be
keeping the Lusitania company in
Davy Jones' locker.

"It was, in fact, reported at
Liverpool that we were sunk, and
we created some surprise when
we steamed up the Mersey.

"The captain of the boat kept
us out of sight of land until we
were thirteen miles from Liver-
pool. We went 500 miles out of
our course to escape the Huns.

"Everything here in England is
black as Hades at night. No lights
anywhere. In the train all the
blinds have to be drawn after
dark, and the lamps of the sta-
tions are all out but three or four,
and those are shaded. It's very
much different from the England
that I know.

"By the time you get this, we
shall be at the front. Every avail-
able man is being sent over now,
and we only expect to be here a
few days.

"Everywhere you are there are
soldiers, soldiers, soldiers. Trains
full of them are running all day
past here. Wounded by the hun-
dreds are coming to England all
the time, and just as many whole
ones are going to France as fast
as they can be shipped."

SECRETARY OF STATE BRYAN RESIGNS SEAT ON PEACE ISSUE

**WILSON'S NOTE TO GERMANY WILL LEAVE WASHINGTON TO-
DAY—ROBERT LANSING SUCCEEDS BRYAN PRO-
TEM—BRYAN TO GO TO COUNTRY ON
PEACE ISSUE.**

Washington, June 9.—Presi-
dent Wilson's note to Germany
will leave here today, and will be
published tomorrow.

Robert Lansing, counsellor for
the State Department, has been
appointed Secretary of State pro-
tem as a result of the resignation
of William Jennings Bryan.

It is believed that Bryan will
start a campaign for the Presi-
dency on a peace issue.

Trains now leave for the East
on Monday, Thursday and Satur-
day at 10:30 a. m., and arrive here
Monday, Wednesday and Friday
at 6:15 a. m.

GERMANS MAKE PROTEST AGAINST DRASTIC ACTION

At the request of the National
Alliance, Jacob Schaefer, presi-
dent of the Washington State and
Seattle German-American Alli-
ances, sent a telegram last night
to President Wilson protesting
against drastic action against
Germany. President Schaefer
also asked the Tacoma and Spo-
kane alliances to send similar
messages. The telegram follows:
"To the President, Washington,
D. C.—The members of the Ger-
man-American State Alliance, as
well as the majority of the citi-
zens of our state, are opposed to
drastic action against Germany as
an unwarranted step. Jacob
Schaefer, president German-
American State and City Alli-
ances."—Seattle P.-I.

VICTIM OF WIRE TAPPING SWINDLE

Los Angeles, June 9.—Having
invested \$1,500 in a wire-tapping
scheme to beat the gamblers on
horse races, H. B. Dauman, a
farmer from Baxter Springs, Kan.,
traveled 1,700 miles east to obtain
his winnings, and failing to get
the money, traveled 1,700 miles
back to this city to make com-
plaint.

Dauman met two alleged wire-
tappers there two weeks ago. They
showed him, he said, "tables load-
ed with about a million in gold."
That induced him to invest \$1,500
drawn from a bank at Miami,
Okla. He then had \$100, which
the men borrowed before they de-
parted, after telling him to meet
them at Topeka, where they would
hand him a huge sum as his
share of the winnings. Dauman
procured enough money to go
East, but did not find the men at
Topeka.
