FOOTBALL.

Football seems to have come to stay in Prince Rupert, for at last night's game the gathering of spectators was larger than at any previous game this season, with the fair sex indeed well represented. The contesting teams were the Sons of England and Regiment, who had already met in a friendly game, when the result was a one-goal draw. The soldiers, however, made a better appearance last night, and always seemed the more likely winners. Right from the start, they made progress and Cunningham, from left back position, gave them the lead with a long shot which deceived the English keeper, while shortly afterwards Atcheson made desperate efforts to reduce the leeway, but with Eardley missing from the halfback line the forwards did not get the necessary support, and their attacks were all to no purpose. The Regimental forwards, unlike their opponents, always looked dangerous when they got to the English end, and Long, who had been forcing the game to advantage, burst through on his own and gave the English keeper no chance with a fast shot, while, from a good pass from the left, he landed the soldiers' fourth goal, just three minutes later, which enabled the Regiment to cross over at half-time leading by four goals to nil.

With visions of that successful second half display against the Drydock, the English supporters were still hopeful, and when Sid Hardy secured a brace of well taken parts they were in high spirits. However, they never seemed to settle to a methodical game, too much long punting being the feature of their play, and when Garnet failed to convert a penalty kick defeat seemed awaiting them. Nothing daunted, they still tried hard, but the soldiers were giving nothing away, being determined to hold their lead. Towards the finish the referee had to order one of the English players off the field, and now their hopes were shattered, and when the final whistle went they had to retire defeated by 4 goals to 2.

W. E. B. Smith handled the game with entire satisfaction to everyone.
