## TERRIFIC VOLCANIC ERUPTION IN JAPAN

### OVERALL FACTORY AT WALKERVILLE WRECKED BY BOMB--FRENCH ADVANCE

#### ONTARIO OVERALL FACTORY PARTIALLY WRECKED BY BOMB

PEABODY'S FACTORY AT WALKERVILLE SHATTERED BY BOMB--SUSPECTED WORK OF DETROIT GERMANS--DYNAMITE PLACED NEAR ARMORY FAILS TO EXPLODE.

Windsor, Ont., June 21.—The overall factory of Peabody & Company, Walkerville, Ont., was partially wrecked by a bomb early today. The firm had just completed a contract for 115,000 British military uniforms. The damage is estimated as under \$10,000.

Twenty-seven sticks of dynamite and a time fuse set at 3:15 a. m., were also placed near the armory where 200 men slept, but the fuse burned out. President Peabody expresses the opinion that the bomb was placed by German sympathizers from Detroit.

#### TELKWA MANSLAUGHTER CASE HEARD TODAY

In the Assize Court this morning the case of Rex vs McMeekin was heard. The charge was one of manslaughter, the indictment of murder having been thrown out by the Grand Jury. Prisoner pleaded guilty, through his counsel, Adair Cars. Mr. Cars explained to the court that the man Dunnigan met his death during some drunken horse play, the accused having no intention of committing the crime of which he is charged. Dr. Wallace of Telkwa was called to testify to the cause of death, and stated that death resulted from a compound fracture of the skull, resulting from contact with a rock pile when the deceased fell to the ground. Mr. Justice Gregory reserved judgment until this afternoon.

#### LIONEL CRIPPEN IS REPORTED KILLED

Corporal John C. Ciceri, of the 30th Battalion, in a letter to his brother in Vancouver, states, in describing fighting which took place on Empire Day, that "Poor little Crippen was killed the same day, or rather mortally wounded, as we found him next day dead, some distance from where he was shot."

Lionel Crippen was one of Prince Rupert's most popular pioneers, who left for Victoria early in the war to join the 30th Battalion. "Crip" was a member of the Legion of Frontiersmen, and, from the day war was declared, was desperately anxious to do his share in the Empire's struggle.

Of a happy-go-lucky disposition, "Crip" made hosts of friends in the city, who will sincerely mourn his loss. In every movement for the city's welfare he took an active part, putting his whole heart into whatever he took in hand.

#### VERDICT OF CORONER'S JURY IN GILBERT DUNTON CASE

#### DEATH SENTENCE IS COMMUTED TO LIFE TERM

Atlanta, June 21.—The death sentence passed on Leo M. Frank, for the murder of Mary Phagan, in April, 1913, has been commuted to one of life imprisonment. Accused was to hang tomorrow. The trial and appeals were much discussed, the evidence being entirely circumstantial.

Frank was the girl's employer, and a young married man of exemplary character. The Governor says he believes accused is innocent.

#### TERRIFIC MARINE VOLCANIC DISTURBANCES NEAR YOKOHAMA

VESSELS REPORT THAT HUGE PILLAR OF FIRE AND SMOKE TURNED DAY INTO NIGHT--RAIN OF LAVA AND ROCKS JAPAN EXPERIENCES SEVERE EARTHQUAKE.

Tokyo, June 21.—A terrifying marine volcanic eruption occurred in the Sea of Japan on June 19, 150 miles south of Yokohama. Vessels report that a pillar of fire accompanied by dense smoke, turned day into night. Huge rocks and quantities of lava rained down on the sea, making it red and boil-

ing. The vessels were struck by a huge tidal wave. Japan felt the strongest earthquake shock experienced in many years, but so far as is known, there have been few casualties.

#### GASOLINE BOAT ON BABINE LAKE

John McAvoy, a land owner in the Babine district, was in Hazelton for a week and left the first of this week for his ranch where he will put in the summer. He reports that a gasoline launch will be put on the lake this summer for passengers and freight. A wagon road has been cut from Babine lake to Burns lake on the railway, and supplies will be hauled across the twelve-mile stretch and then put on the boat. Besides Cronin's property and the assessment work to be done on other prospects, it is understood that the Silver Island property will be developed to some extent this season. He stated that Silver Island had recently been bonded for a hundred thousand dollars to a Spokane syndicate who will put a number of men to work at once.—Omenica Herald.
