SUCCESSSES IN DARDANELLES
BRITISH TAKE 500 PRISONERS

THE FRENCH AND BRITISH GAIN 400 YARDS ON A ONE MILE FRONT--GUNNERS FROM GOBEN AND BRESLAU CAPTURED--VATICAN PROTESTS AGAINST ARTICLE

Paris, June 24.—(Official) The result of attacks yesterday by the French and British in the Dardanelles was a gain of 400 yards along a mile front. The British took five hundred prisoners in the capture of a redoubt, which was manned by German gunners from the Goeben and the Breslau.
Vatican Denial.

SEATTLE TO KEEP
BIG FISH TRADE

Efforts of Prince Rupert to divert that portion of the fisheries industry controlled by the Booth Fisheries Company of Chicago from Seattle were barren of anything but some good advice given to the citizens of Prince Rupert by L. P. Smithers, vice president of the Corporation. Mr. Smithers who recently returned from that city, inspected what the city had to offer, but made no agreement to change from Seattle to the British Columbia port.
"Although we were offered a free site and cheap power and ice I do not think that we will move our coast business to Prince Rupert," said Mr. Smithers last night at the New Washington. "Of course, if our hands are tied too much in the United States, there is a possibility of a move, but I do not consider this likely."
"When the subject was broached to me at Prince Rupert I advised the people of that city to build up their own halibut trade and handle the fish brought in in Canadian bottoms, instead of trying to take the Seattle industry away from Seattle. If they do so into the business extensively enough we will probably put in a branch at Prince Rupert to handle our Canadian trade."

ITALIAN ARRESTED
ON MURDER CHARGE

RUSSIANS WITHDREW FROM
LEMBERG WITH LINE INTACT

RUSSIANS RESISTED STRONGLY TO LAST—TOWN IS LITTLE DAMAGED—RUSSIAN LINE REMAINS UNBROKEN—PRIZE COURT TO TRY CASE OF AMERICAN TANKER

London, June 24.—Details of the taking of Lemberg show that the Russians resisted strongly to the last and then retreated from Rowa Ruska to an angle formed by the rivers San and Vistula.
The town was little damaged, except by fire at the oil tanks, railway stations and factories, started before the Russian withdrawal. The Russian line remains unbroken.
American Tanker Seized.
London, June 24.—The case of the American tanker Gargoye is to be tried before a prize court. The vessel was seized at Malta carrying oil for Alexandria.

PUBLIC FUNERAL
FOR WARNEFORD

Paris, June 24.—Arrangements for the funeral services at Versailles for Lieut. R. A. J. Warneford, of the British Royal navy Flying Corps, and Henry B. Needham, the American writer, who were killed in an aeroplane accident last Thursday, have been cancelled and the bodies have been brought to Paris. Mr. Needham's body has been placed in the mortuary chapel in the American Church of the Holy Trinity, awaiting a reply to a dispatch to his widow, who is in the United States, asking for instructions. Lieut. Warneford's body will be sent to England, where some form of public funeral befitting the man who has been hailed as a hero for his recent destruction of a Zeppelin, will be held.
A small aeroplane, composed of flowers, was laid on Warneford's coffin by the officers and men of the English hospital. On the left wing was a Victoria Cross and on the right the legion of honor. The propeller, composed of white roses, bears the inscription "Honored by the King; admired by the Empire, but mourned by all."
Warneford's body will be transported to London tomorrow morning under a guard of honor.

GOOD PROSPECTS OF
LIEUT. TUPPER'S RECOVERY

Ottawa, June 24.—A miraculous escape from death at St. Julien was that of Lieut. Reginald Tupper, son of Sir Charles Tupper, according to a letter received here. Lieut. Tupper was shot through the thigh, the bullet passing through the lower part of his body. He managed, however, to stick to his gun when a second series of shots went through both legs. One leg was broken and the heel of the other was shot off. Lieut. Tupper crawled to a trench where he waited for some hours before a stretcher-bearer came. Gangrene developed and the doctors gave him up, but the young officer has pulled through and is now in England with good prospects of recovery.
