## HEROES ALL

The fact that five valiant officers of the Canadian Expeditionary Force have been mentioned in despatches, and recommended for the Distinguished Service Order, by Sir John French, is something for all Canadians to be proud of. The valorous deeds of those brave men, two of whom fell in the fray, were noticed. How many more such acts of heroism must have passed unnoticed?

In the terrific onslaughts around Ypres and St. Julien, every man must have been a hero, and, in years to come, to have taken part in the charge at St. Julien will be a mark of distinction equal to any decoration. In history, this charge will rank with the doings of the "Thin Red Line," and the Light Brigade in the Crimean war.

Heroism produces heroism, just as surely as wheat produces wheat, and the spirit of Waterloo and Balaclava is reproduced today. The men who have fallen, and the men who are still fighting, have attained to the high standard set of old and have set the same standard for the men who will follow. Heroes will take the place of heroes, until the Huns have been vanquished.

## THE WAR SITUATION

Though it seems as though the Russians have vacated Lemberg, they are by no means defeated. Latest reports from Petrograd are decidedly cheering, and, if the Russians can keep the Austro-Germans busy along the Dneister, and in Bukovina, the enemy will not have much spare energy to devote to stopping the Italians. The latter are meeting with difficulties, but, so far, seem to have met with no real setback.

With the French assuming the offensive in Alsace, the Kaiser's attention is going to be spread over a wider area than ever, and, with a strong offensive developing on the western front, things are becoming much more interesting than they have been for weeks.

It now transpires that, when the Italian fleet left Taranto recently under sealed orders, they were not bound for Trieste as was supposed, but to join the Allied fleet in the Dardanelles. The Italian fleet must have reached its destination now, and a fresh naval attack in that quarter is liable to be reported at any moment. The Dardanelles attack is probably the most important of the war, as an Allied success there will not only shatter Turkish hopes, but will open up the route to the Black Sea, thus allowing Russian wheat to get out, and munitions to be taken in.

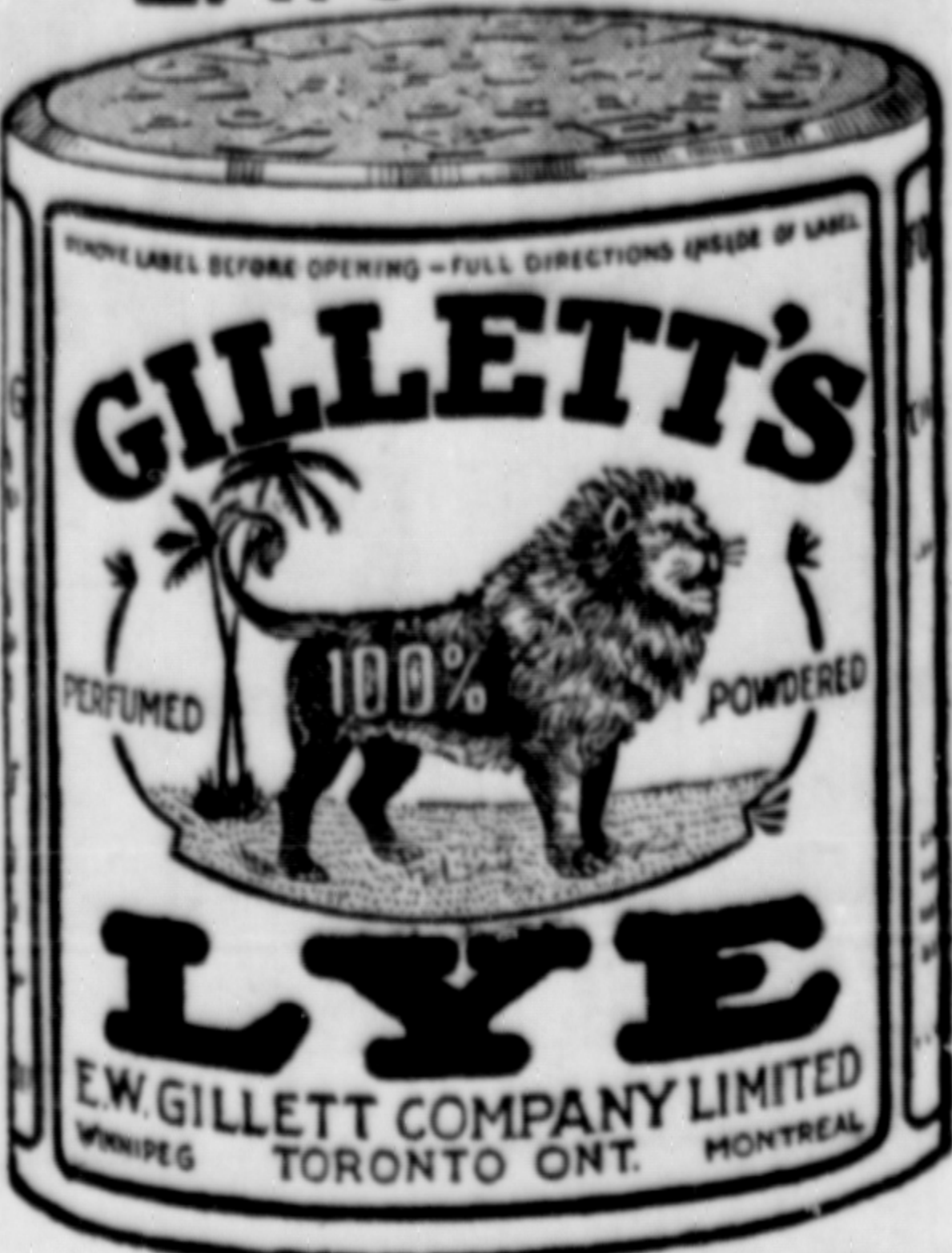

## GERMANS SPY ON THE BRITISH CABINET

London, June 23.—The great number of Germans and Austrians still at large in London and elsewhere again has been the subject of agitation in the house of commons. Sir Edwin Cornwall, Liberal member for Bethnal Green in the house of commons, declared he had been informed three of the present ministers had secretaries who are of German origin. This statement remained unanswered during the session that ensued, but Sir John Simon, the home secretary, said that the internment of aliens of enemy countries was proceeding as rapidly as possible.

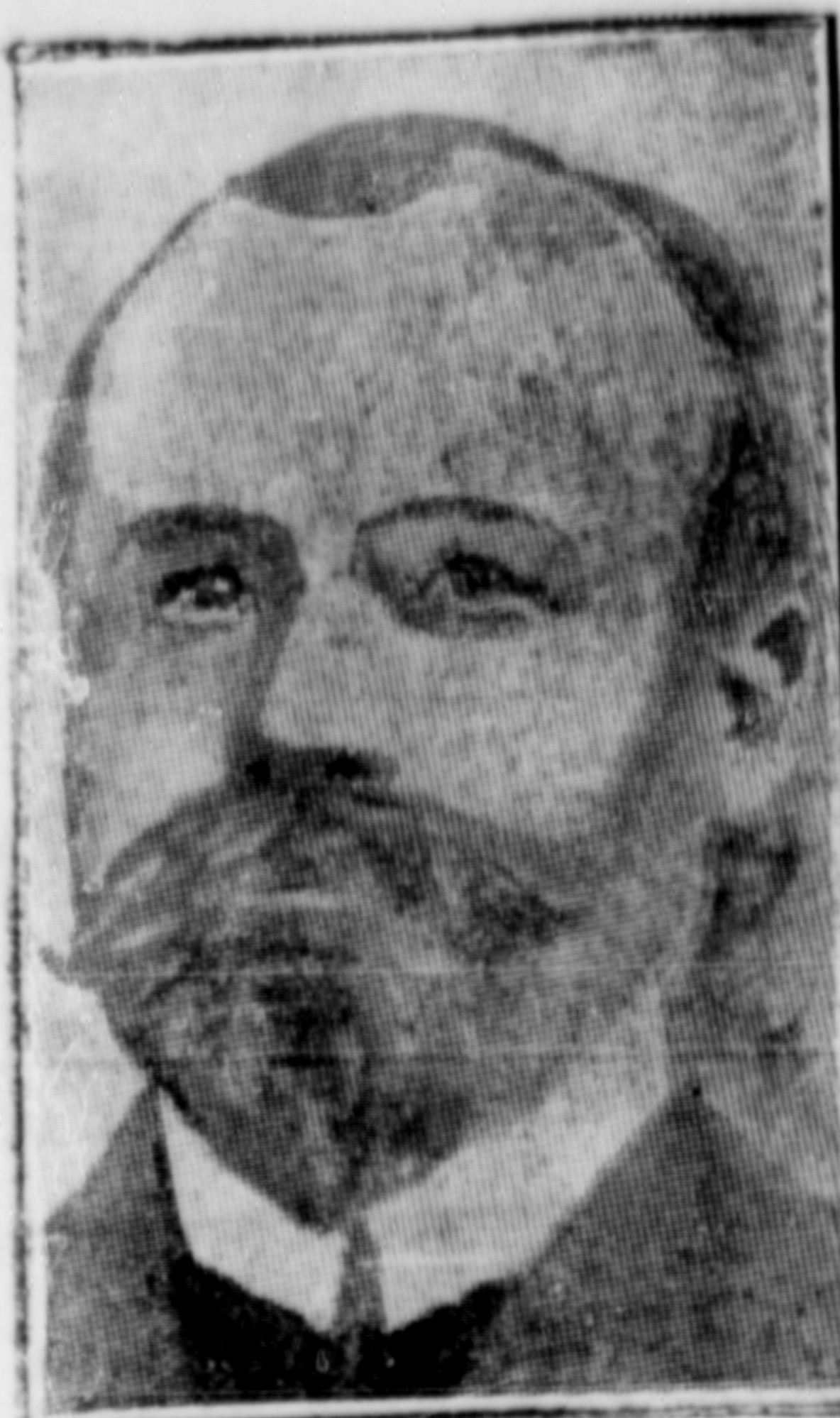
