MORE SUGGESTIONS FOR CIVIC RETRENCHMENT

The News has been asked to publish the following letter, which Mr. Angle sent to the Mayor some days ago:

To Mayor Newton—Please define the present duties of the city clerk at a salary of \$185 per month, as compared with the duties of the same person in 1910 and 1911, at a salary of \$150 per month; when he at that time was city clerk, city treasurer, city purchasing agent and materially aided in the drafting of bylaws and city contracts?

Please define the duties of the present city treasurer, at \$200 per month, as compared with the duties of the city clerk, city treasurer and city purchasing agent of 1910 and 1911 at a salary of \$150 per month? the same person performing the three-fold duties.

Please define the duties of the present city solicitor, at \$250 per month, with those of the city solicitor of 1911, at a salary of \$150 per month,—with no money in the treasury for the performance of public works or the protecting of contracts?

Please compare the \$12,000 purchase of unnecessary stock for the Telephone and Light Department of the present time, as instanced by the number of spools of cable now lying exposed to the weather near the old electric light plant—also the pile of electric poles rotting at the corner of McBride and Sixth Avenue. I ask you to compare this with the same unnecessary purchase of water pipe, steam rollers and useless culverts of the Engineering Department of 1911, when you took such an active stand in abusing the 1911 Council and the then chairman of the Board of Works with extravagance and incompetency; all of which caused the Council of 1912 to rise to the occasion and expunge the whole department to the saving of some \$10,000 annually. Does the saddle not gall under its present rider? or has the emoluments of office calloused the honest principles then espoused in the interest of the suffering ratepayers?

Please state why two stationary engineers are required at the old electric light plant at \$125 per month each, when two switchmen at \$85 per month can perform the work, as done in similar plants elsewhere?

Please state if there is one man in the city employ, in the electrical department, that can wind an armature when necessary; or if the armature must be sent to Vancouver to be wound? If there is such a man, please state his

TORNADO VISITS CALGARY DISTRICT

Calgary, June 26.—The most terrific wind, thunder and rain-storm that Southern Alberta has experienced for very many years swept the district south and east of here yesterday, and besides killing three and injuring about a dozen persons in Grassy Lake and playing havoc with the business district of Red Cliffe, a small town near Medicine Hat, the fury of the gale resulted in a bad washout of the Natural Gas Company's main, which cut off the supply in Calgary, causing great inconvenience to householders and partially tying up many industries. The C. P. R. line was washed out to the west and south of Calgary, causing damage which will likely take forty-eight hours to repair.

The Bow River is in the most extraordinary condition in the last thirteen years and is still rising at the rate of four inches an hour. The phenomenally heavy rainfall during the past seventy-two hours has resulted in cave-ins all over the city and the flooding of hundreds of basements of private houses. The total rainfall for the period stated is 1.32 inches.

All rivers in the district are roaring torrents and water from rainfall in the mountains continues to cause them to rise.

PANAMA CANAL TOLLS.

Washington, D. C., June 28.—A total of \$4,000,000 in tolls has been collected at the Panama Canal since it opened. During April the tolls exceeded the cost of operation by \$84,112, being \$442,415 to \$358,303.
