### THE NEW RUSSIA.

The promises of political reform in Russia, made by the Czar in the early stages of the war, were accepted by outsiders rather skeptically. Russia had endured political darkness so long that it was felt that nothing short of a terrible revolution could bring enlightenment. However, the recent report from Petrograd stating that a commission has been appointed to carry out the preliminary arrangements for Polish autonomy, encourages the belief that a great day of liberalism is dawning for Russia.

Under a democratic form of government, Russia will develop into one of the great world powers in commerce. With an area and population much larger than the United States; very valuable oil fields in Galicia; great mineral wealth in the Ural Mountains, and vast wheat lands equal to anything on this continent, Russia has enormous possibilities. Political uncertainty has caused foreign capital to give Russia a wide berth in the past, so far as private enterprise was concerned, and she has paid her outside debts by exporting largely raw material. A revolution in the land of the Czar has seemed imminent for years, and, if a bloodless revolution has begun now, it will be much more effective and far-reaching than a general upheaval could ever be. If the day of an evil bureaucracy is over, there is a great day ahead for Russia. With efficient railroad and industrial development, this great country, with its population of about 150,000,000 and vast natural resources, may in time become the greatest industrial country in Europe.

If the Polish commission is a farce, and proceeds to do nothing as noisily and expensively as possible, as commissions have been known to do,

even in enlightened Canada, there is a terrible day of reckoning in store for the "little father" and his friends. If the promises of reform were merely political promises, made today and forgotten tomorrow, the end of the present war will see the beginning of Russia's real troubles. The present crisis has shaken Europe to its foundations. Ideas have died in the struggle, as well as men, but, just as thousands of clerks, office men, tradesmen, politicians, and political hangers-on have rediscovered themselves as men, so have new ideas and ideals come to life. Men and nations, who have been moving complacently along in the deep ruts, have been suddenly jolted out into the open, and they can never return to the same old ruts again. In all the belligerent countries revolutions are taking place now in political, industrial, social and religious life, but the greatest change will be in Russia. Whether the bureaucratic government is aware of it or not, the revolution is going on now, and nothing can stop it. If the old ideas are allowed to die a natural death, and the Czar and his government guide the new growth wisely, all will be well, but if further effort is made to retard the natural development of this great people Russia will be steeped in blood.

### CANADIAN NEWSPAPER DIRECTORY FOR 1915

It is now nearly a quarter of a century since Mr. A. McKim, who established the first independent advertising agency in this country, completed the rather ambitious task of publishing the first Directory of Canadian publications. The nine successive editions of this valuable work provide the most complete and detailed record available of the growth of Canadian periodicals.

The 1915 edition, of which we have just received a copy, shows that the great war has not seriously affected the newspapers of Canada. While the birth-rate of new publications has received a check, and the death-rate of the weak ones has perhaps increased a trifle, most of the leading papers, particularly the dailies, show very healthy increases in circulation. Three metropolitan dailies have reached or passed the hundred thousand mark.

A census of the papers listed and described in the 1915 Directory shows nearly 150 dailies, 7 tri-weeklies, 45 semi-weeklies, over 1,065 weeklies, about 40 bi-weeklies or semi-monthlies, 250 monthlies, 3 bi-monthlies and 18 quarterlies—a total of over 1,575 publications.

This means approximately one daily to every 10,000 families, and one weekly to every 1,500 families. From this one would infer that for a comparatively new country, Canada is well-read.
