Proportional Representation.

In Winnipeg the election of members for the legislature was conducted under the proportional representation plan. It provides for second, third and fourth choice and even more and makes it possible to elect representatives who will more nearly represent the people than by any other method yet worked out.

Proportional representation is one of the planks of the Liberal platform in this province and doubtless some day will be adopted. The objection to it is that it makes for group representation, every group of people in the country being able to secure a spokesman.

It will be remembered that at one time there was a small Socialist balance of power in this province and as a result James Hawthornthwaite was able to dictate the policy of the Government to a very large extent, and since that time Mr. Hawthornthwaite has been a capitalist.

The tendency of the day is toward group representation, even without the aid of proportional representation. Just what will be the final system, however, no one knows. We are experimenting in democratic methods. All the methods look well on paper, but often unexpected results follow.

Old Clothes League is Latest Fad.

The latest fad is an "old clothes league." This organization is sending out a circular urging that production be increased and that thrift be practiced and encouraged.

Lloyd George at Church Conference.

At a non-conformist church conference in Wales Lloyd George, speaking in Welsh, made use of these words: "It is not so much to promote any special reforms as to create an atmosphere in which not only is reform impossible, but in which a perpetuation of evil is impossible."

There was today, Mr. Lloyd George continued, great confusion and conflict of purposes, paralyzing goodwill in every land. "When I left," he said, "we were discussing in Parliament Bolshevism, the latest fashion among the rulers of darkness in this world."

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

U.S. GROWERS STORING WOOL

Drop in Prices would Spell Ruin at Present Prices

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Wool growers have decided to hold their stocks for better prices, and no wool will be sold at present prices, according to announcement made tonight by the American Farm Bureau Federation. Telegrams to the Federation stated that the Wool Growers' Associations in Maryland, Missouri, Arkansas, Kentucky and Indiana have gone on record as determined to hold the spring wool clip unless prices are nearer normal. The Federation authorized this statement: "F. R. Marshall of Salt Lake City, secretary of the National Wool Growers' Association, states that the majority of the range states will place their stocks in warehouses and secure loans on warehouse receipts, in accordance with a plan recently worked out with the Federal Reserve Board. The normal clip of wool in this country amounts to about 300,000,000 pounds, but on account of the severe winter and consequent losses the clip is probably ten per cent. light this year. Wool producers do not expect to make any money on the past year's operations, but accepting the present price would spell ruin for most of them. The total losses would run well above a hundred million dollars."

ADVOCATES WHIPPING TO PREVENT CRIME

DETROIT, July 5.—Restoration of the whipping post and thumb-screws are endorsed by Wm. A. Pinkerton, world-famous detective, as a means of diminishing crime. He told the International Police Chiefs Association that the whipping post had been retained in Delaware and had done wonders in cleaning up the state. "I know criminals fear the pain of it, and pain is a lesson better than shame," he said. "There is no such thing as reforming a man with soft soap." Mr. Pinkerton recommended the strictest censorship of motion pictures, and expressed the opinion that crime films or magazine illustrations of criminal acts should be prohibited by Federal law. "No-one is a bigger bug about the movies than I," he said, "but we make a mistake by making the bandit the film heroic. Boys who see it say 'That's easy, we can do it,' and they do. Movies are a great educational medium, but they also can be a harmful one."

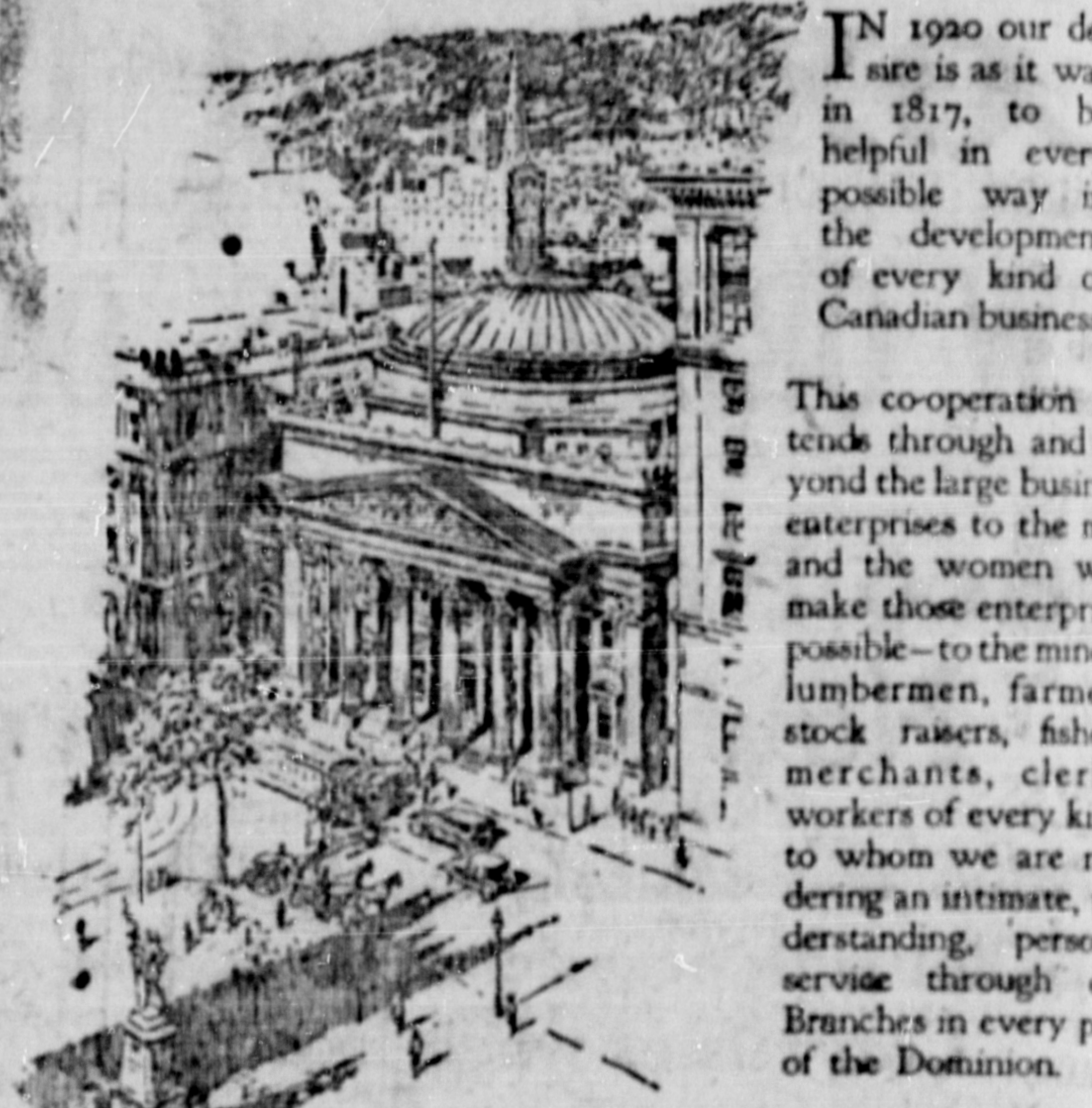
