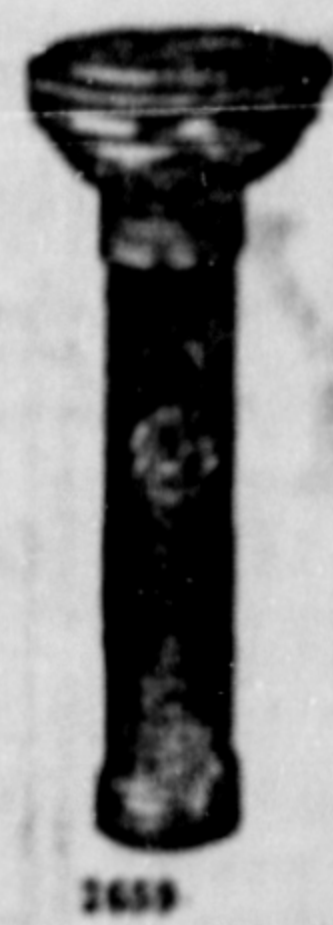

the B.C. Undertakers.

Terrible Fate of Mrs. James  
Bonner and Children at Jasper  
Park

EDMONTON, July 5.—Mrs.  
James Bonner, wife of the car in-  
spector of the Grand Trunk Pac-  
ific Railway at Jasper and her  
four children, the oldest of whom  
was but eleven years, were all  
burned to death in a fire which  
destroyed their home and two  
other residences early Saturday  
morning. The mother and baby  
were rescued, but expired later.
