RAILROADERS SCORED WIN

Got the One Score of Keenly-Contested and Interesting Match With Callies Last Night.

In the football game last evening between the Callies and Grand Trunks—the latter won by the score of 1 to 0. It was the first league match in the second half of the season's schedule and the large crowd which filled the grand stand evinced the interest which is now being taken in football. Last night's two teams have played to a draw in two other games during the season and neither of them up to last evening had been beaten. It looked for a while last night that it might be a no-score game as it was not until almost the end of the second half that the railwaymen put in the lone goal.

The first half was more or less a punting match between the defenders of both sides, but some good rushes were made at Gollies Martin and Waldorf. Both teams seemed to be nervous and waiting for the break. The kicking was erratic with no one settling down to the task of scoring. Just before half time the G. T. P. boys took the advantage of the down grade were pressing very hard and left half O'Donnell got greatly excited at the throw-ins. At the whistle the two teams readily took to the side lines with no scores tallied up to that time.

At the resumption of play there was the same feeling as at first but the Callies had steadied down with the satisfaction that they had held their own on the up hill. When Jack Stewart centred the ball from the corner it looked as though Bill Murray would make it good but the ball grazed over the top. At the closing whistle the Scotsmen were still making great efforts to get through.

At the Market Place grounds tonight there will be a fixture between the Drydocks and the Junior Giants under the Junior baseball league series.

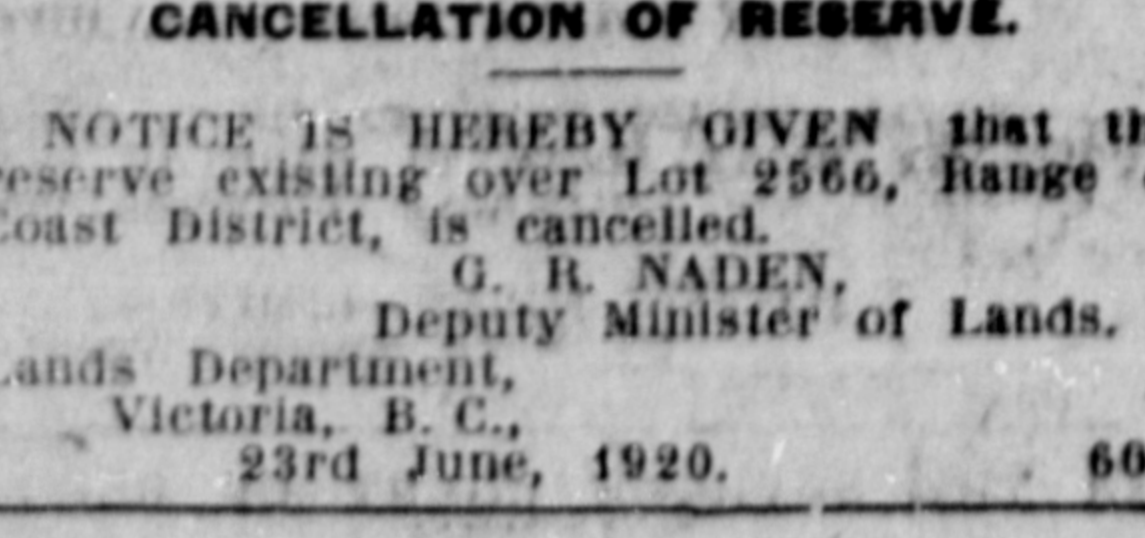
