

First Act Is Now Over.

The nominations for men to represent the two main political take place next November being concluded, political campaigning will now commence in the true sense of the word in all sections of the great republic. These nominations are an important event in connection with United States elections and often command as much interest and excitement as the elections themselves. For the time being the parties lost sight of politics and concentrate on the selection of a leader, but once this leader has been selected all rally once more to the political banner.

Stage Set For Elections.

The recent primaries have been contested probably more keenly than has been the case for some time. Faced with international problems and questions of more than usual momentaffairs that affect the moulding of the nation's destiny more than any others ever experienced-the parties have necessarily divided themselves into factions and in both the case of the Republicans! and Democrats, and more so in the latter, it took more time and much diplomacy to heal these differences. In fact, the successful candidates are in a questionable position on many points and have, in many cases, pursued the policy of "sitting on the fence." This quadrennial selection in the United States will be attended with more than usual interest the world over.

Must Have Honest Policies.

Whether a Republican or a Democrat goes to the White House in March, 1921, is a question of American domestic politics with which foreigners have no active concern. We shall welcome either as the representative of the American people, and we shall be prepared impartially to discuss with either in the friendliest manner the many questions which we have in common. It is stated that we must be ready for readjustment in our relations with the United States and that the process will not be easy. That depends in a great measure upon ourselvess If we have a straight, clear, and honest policy in world affairs, firmly based Port Simpson both at springs and upon those plain principles which are common to Americans and neaps. May Look for

Decreasing Prices. There is now a more hopeful feeling about prices and the high cost of living. The whole tendency of the chief markets is towards a fall in prices although wheat and sugar are both steady if not rising. There has been a slackening off in business and buyers in many trades are developing cautiousness with a disposition to hold back. The banks' restrictions on credit are making speculators anxious. These influences have a depressing effect on the markets, and benefit from which the public may soon reap in lower prices. The movement in the United States recently has been very sweeping and will reflect in Canada.
