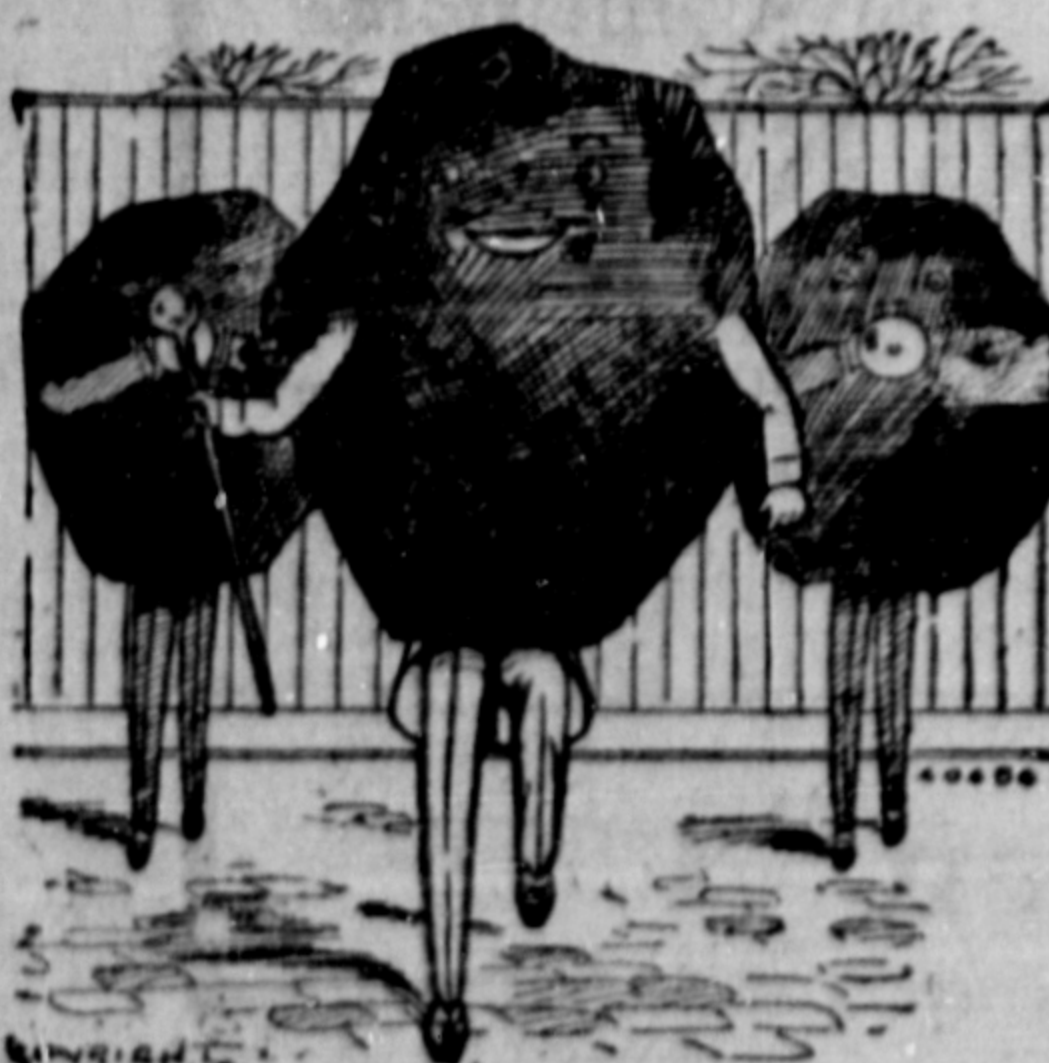

WATER NOTICE

(USE AND STORAGE)

TAKE NOTICE that Taylor Mining Company Limited, whose address is 607 Credit Foncier Building, Vancouver, B. C., will apply for a license to take and use 2,500 acre feet of water out of Clearwater Creek, a tributary of the Kitimat River, which flows westerly and easterly into the Kitimat River about 23 miles north of Alice Arm, in the Province of British Columbia.

The storage-dam will be located at the outlet of Clearwater Lake. The capacity of the reservoir to be created is about 2,500 acre feet and it will flow about 200 acres of land. The water will be diverted from the stream at a point about the outlet of Clearwater Lake. The position of which will be determined after survey, and will be used for power purposes upon the territory described in an area of 50 miles radius from the Wolf Group of Mineral claims near the Kitimat River.
