WESTERN SHOW THIS EVENING

Picture at Westholme Theatre
Tonight Mas Plot Laid in Canada.

There is a strange tale of Oriental mysticism in "The River's End" that will both startle and fascinate. This picture from the book by James Oliver Curwood, author of "Back to God's Country" will be shown at the Westholme Theatre tonight.

Shan Tung, a Chinese, is a prince in disguise. Driven from his own country by political factions, he settles in northwestern Canada on the edge of civilization, where he keeps an opium den and traffics in vice.

The Chinaman because of his wealth in the community is a power. He falls in love with a beautiful white girl and demands that she marry him. She loathes him and is horrified yet he holds a strange spell over her and she is apparently unable to resist his will.

She appeals to an officer of the Royal Northwest Police to help her free herself from his influence but she withholds some secret from him, evidently fearing to reveal it.

The Chinese is getting more and more of a hold on her when the officer of the police visits the den on Shan Tung's command, and Shan Tung openly demands that he be a party to the deliverance of the white girl to him.

But the officer is not the brave Shan Tung thought and a terrific battle ensues in which the den is set on fire and burned. What happens to the officer and the girl is something worth seeing.

TO REBATE RENT FOR HOUSE WHEN CHILD IS BORN

ST. JOSEPH, M., July 8.—Walter Fulkerson, St. Joseph banker, is building a row of houses for rent to families in which there are children. Newly married couples also will be allowed to occupy the houses with the provision that if there are no children in their families at the end of one year's residence they will be asked to vacate.

Whenever a child is born in one of his houses, Mr. Fulkerson announced, the rent for that year will be returned to the tenant.

His houses are in one of St. Joseph's most desirable residential districts.

SALMON YESTERDAY

At the Fish Exchange yesterday morning there were two salmon trollers in with large catches of fish. The halibut boats were practically absent from the harbor as they remained out to catch for the sale this morning. The Silver Spray with 1,500 lbs. reds, 300 lbs. whites and 23 cohoes sold to the Atlin Fisheries at 15.5c per pound for reds, 5.1c for whites, and 50c each for cohoes. The Catharine with 1,200 lbs. of reds, 100 lbs. whites and 20 cohoes sold to the Royal Fish Co. for the same prices as quoted in the case of the Silver Spray.

The Sitka has arrived in port with 67,000 lbs. of halibut for the Canadian Fish and Cold Storage Co., Ltd.

WARSAW, July 8.—The Poles are calling for volunteers to meet the advancing armies of the Bolshoviki. During the fighting of the past few days the Soviet forces have claimed several successes.

THE SPA, July 9.—Despite their request for fifteen months to complete disarmament, the Germans have been granted only till October 1 to reduce their standing army to 100,000 and till January 1 to get it down to 100,000. Lloyd George says that the German people are retaining thousands of guns.

NOTICE TO REAL ESTATE AGENTS AND SALESMEN

Under the provisions of the Real Estate Agents' Licensing Act, 1920, which becomes effective July 20, 1920, every Real Estate Agent or Salesman operating within the Province shall take out a licence. Section 4 of said Act provides that no person shall act, or offer, or undertake to act as a Real Estate Agent or Salesman in this province without first having applied for and obtained a licence. Penalty for non-compliance with provisions of this Act is a fine of not less than fifty dollars and not more than five hundred dollars.
