

MEN WANTED To Handle Lumber

The undersigned Mill Operators on Masset Inlet, having found it impossible to ship lumber for the past month, owing to the failure of the Grand Trunk Pacific and the Edgshoremen's Union to agree on the wages to be paid, have offered the longshoremen the maximum of their demands from the Railway Company, that is Ninety Cents per hour plus fifteen per cent to provide for the higher cost of living said to obtain in Prince Rupert.

They have refused to accept our offer and in the meantime our mills and those who would be working in them are idle.

FRESH FRUIT COMING AGAIN

Summer Season Shows Itself in Local Stores—Prices are Weakening.

During the past week there has been a marked increase in the amount of fruit coming into the stores of the local retailers. As it is the beginning of the season the price has been rather high but a drop is expected soon. Fresh strawberries will likely arrive in quantity from Terrace before the end of next week. Large orders have been placed with the ranchers as the demand is high on the local market alone.

All the old potatoes are practically off the display bins and are rapidly being replaced by new ones. Next week ought to mark a decrease in the price asked for these new potatoes as many car loads have been arriving in Vancouver.

This is the off season for shell fish and fresh rabbits and neither will arrive in quantities until about the first of September.

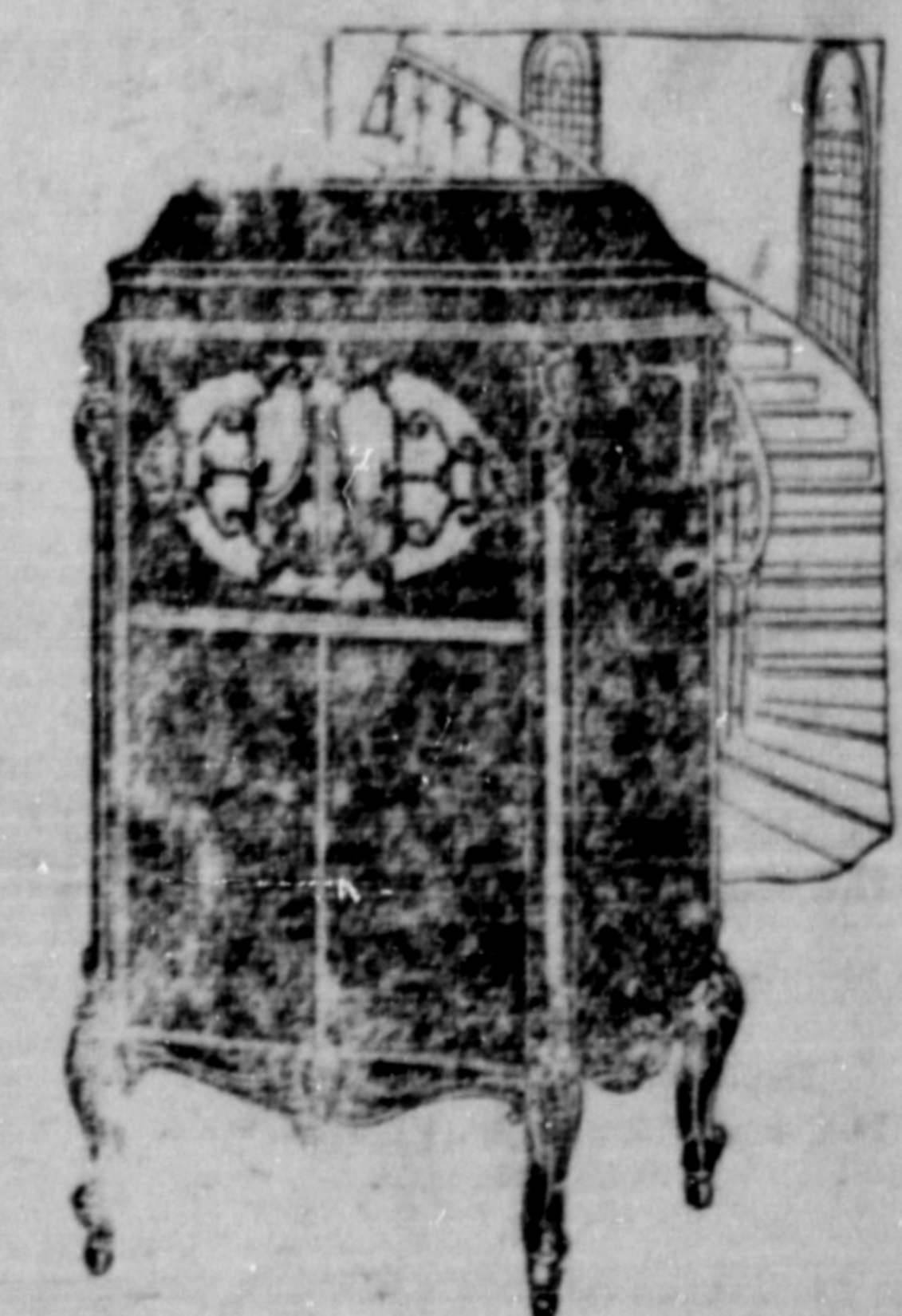
