**UNIVERSITY STUDENTS
GAIN SCHOLARSHIPS
ACROSS THE BORDER**

VANCOUVER, July 12.—Two students of the University of British Columbia who graduated at the last congregation of the institution have been awarded scholarships in American universities. Hugh E. Keenleyside, B.A., has been honored with the American Antiquarian Society's fellowship at Clark University, Wooster, Mass., valued at \$500, and will leave in the middle of September to continue his studies at the eastern college. On graduation from U. B. C. he won two scholarships in history.

Walter Couper, B.A., has been awarded the Flood Scholarship in Economics at the University of California, valued at \$500, and will leave for the southern state in August to pursue his studies at Berkeley.

**ORANGEMEN ARE
CELEBRATING DAY**

Battle of Boyne Anniversary is Occasion for Picnic at Port Simpson—Church Parade Last Night.

There were about fifty Orangemen to join the annual church parade of the Orange Lodge to the Anglican Church last evening. They assembled at the Knights of Pythias hall and Robert Warrior and Worshipful Master E. R. Tabrum took charge marshalling the parade to the church where Canon G. A. Rex delivered a very appropriate sermon.

Today, July 12, the anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne, the lodge has declared a holiday among themselves and are making an excursion to Port Simpson. Shortly after 8 o'clock this morning about thirty of their number marched down Third Avenue to the tempo of J. N. Kelly's kettle drum. At the waterfront they were joined by families and friends and nearly 100 left on the launches "Oh Baby," "Narbhong," "Regal" and "Dixie Rupert" for the Indian village. The day will be spent in true picnic style and there is a football game this afternoon. They are expected home this evening.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

**FREDERICK JACKLIN
HAS PASSED AWAY**

After Illness of Several Months Death Occurred at Family Home on Saturday Night.

The death occurred at 9 o'clock Saturday night of Frederick Jacklin at his residence on English Hill. The deceased had been ailing for some months and death did not come unexpectedly.

Mr. Jacklin was 52 years of age and was a native of England. Together with his wife and family he came to this country seven years ago and spent four years employed at the Georgetown saw-mill. Three years ago he moved to this city and has since been employed in the building and bridges department of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway. Mr. Jacklin was a carpenter by trade and was respected by all with whom he came in contact.

He is survived by a widow and three children, Mrs. Don W. Peck, Keith, aged 9, and Mavis, 6, for whom general sympathy will be felt. Funeral arrangements are in the hands of the B. C. Undertakers.

NOTICE TO REAL ESTATE AGENTS AND SALESMEN.

Under the provisions of The Real Estate Agents' Licensing Act, 1920, which becomes effective July 20, 1920, every Real Estate Agent and Salesman operating within the Province shall take out a licence. Section 4 of said Act provides that no person shall act, or offer, or undertake to act as a Real Estate Agent or Salesman in this province without first having applied for and obtained a licence.

Penalty for non-compliance with provisions of this Act is a fine of not less than fifty dollars and not more than five hundred dollars.

Application for licences must be made to Government Agents or Collectors throughout the Province.
