## Another Chance To Register.

The Provincial Government has now advanced the date for the registration of voters to August 1 to further assure that all possessing the privilege of the franchise may avail themselves of the opportunity to register and qualify themselves as voters in the various districts of the province. The process of registering is most simple and takes only a moment at the office of a registrar qualified to take the declaration. One must be a British citizen, male or female, of the full age of twenty-one years and have resided in the district for at least six months. A person can register any time before August 1, but the sensible time is now. The qualified registrars include election commissioners, postmasters, justices of the peace, magistrates, constables or government office officials. There is one of the officials within reach at almost any time, so why not register before you forget about it? Many will remember on August 2 but then it will be too late.

## Home Canning Is the Solution.

The high prices of fruits and sugar will no doubt deter many housewives from doing home canning this year. It is quite possible, however, that a serious blunder would be made by cutting down the preserving of fruits and vegetables.

The United States department of agriculture, in a bulletin just issued, gives many reasons why it would be a mistake to neglect the preserving kettle, despite unfavorable prices and the difficulty encountered in obtaining sugar. For more than six months indications have presaged a shortage of farm products from wheat to pickles. Latest government reports prove the correctness of earlier forecasts, for, although there recently has been improvement in the outlook for grain production per acre, the smaller cultivated area both in grain and vegetables prove the folly of too great optimism.

Canned goods are likely to cost more next winter. National canning organizations have frankly declared that the greater costs of products on the farms, transportation delays and expense, higher wages to factory workers, and the increased prices of cans and other materials make it impossible to keep prices down to present levels—already too high from the consumers' viewpoint. These assertions are borne out by the U. S. government's latest warning, which goes so far as to advise that "there is not even assurance that there will be enough canned products to go around. The solution is home canning," it declares.

## Question of Banking Hours.

From time to time agitations arise in various parts of the country to have the banks keep their offices open on Saturday night. The argument advanced is that it would give the working classes better opportunity to do their banking and would also encourage banking among these classes. The point is very well taken but the bankers have strong arguments against the action. One argument is that the worker in asking this consideration for himself is losing sight of the fact that he is having the banker work when he would not wish to work himself. Another argument is that with the opening of so many new branches since the armistice was signed the bank service has been taken closer to the public. Perhaps a more satisfactory solution for the problem would be the keeping of the banking offices open on half holidays to the trades and their half holiday being shifted to some other day in the week besides Saturday.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

NOTICE TO REAL ESTATE AGENTS AND SALESMEN.

Under the provisions of The Real Estate Agents' Licensing Act, 1920, which became effective July 2nd, 1920, every Real Estate Agent and Salesman operating within the Province shall take out a licence. Section 4 of said Act provides that no person shall act, or offer, or undertake to act as a Real Estate Agent or Salesman in this province without first having applied for and obtained a licence.

Penalty for non-compliance with provisions of this Act is a fine of not less than fifty dollars and not more than five hundred dollars.
