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## Marshal Foch Summoned to The Spa

### WINDSTORM, LIGHTNING AND CLOUDBURSTS DO DAMAGE AROUND SPOKANE

#### State University Suffers in Storm

Wind lasting only One Minute does Great Damage in Inland Empire; Power Railways are Tied Up

PULLMAN, Wash., July 14.—A windstorm of one minute's duration yesterday afternoon damaged many buildings, grain fields and orchards in this town and vicinity. Between this and cloudbursts and electrical storms damage to the extent of \$50,000 was done to the Washington State College which is located here. Even houses were washed away at Winona village. The Inland Empire power services have been interrupted and several trains are stalled at Lewiston, Idaho.

#### ALMON RUN ON FRASER IS NOT YET COMMENCED

Flood Height of River Prevents Sockeye Coming in and Springs Are Running High.  
 NEW WESTMINSTER, July 14.—The Almon run on the Fraser River is not yet commenced. The flood height of the river is preventing the sockeye from coming in and the springs are running high. The present time is delaying the sockeye run. Spring salmon are bringing 12 cents a pound here and whites, 10 cents.

#### DESPITE REPORT OF ARMISTICE, FIGHTING STILL IS GOING ON

WARSAW, July 14.—The Poles are removing material from the city of Warsaw as the Reds are now menacing Vilna. The Poles are determined to defend the city to the last. They are using bombing balloons in their present operations.

#### HANNA IS NOW ON HIS WAY WEST

Will Visit Prince Rupert on Tour Having to do with Unification of the Railways.

WINNIPEG, July 14.—D. B. Hanna, head of the Canadian National Railways, is here on his way to Prince Rupert, Vancouver and Victoria on a trip of inspection. It is understood that his tour has to do with the coming unification of the western railroads.

#### MINSK CAPTURED

LONDON, July 13.—Minsk has been captured by the Bolsheviks who are now 250 miles northwest of Warsaw. Yesterday morning the first stop was at Usk where an opportunity was given the sight-seers to witness logging and sawing in full operation. The Kleanza Company provided a bounteous lunch in their camp dining hall. A number of the men walked down the track and inspected the plant of the Kitzelias Copper Company's mine which is about three miles west of the station.

#### Terrace Reception.

At Terrace a splendid turn out was made by the people with Messrs. D. D. Munro, Geo. Keith and Rev. T. J. Marsh sparing no efforts to make their guests enjoy themselves properly during the brief stay of the hour. The gardens were thrown open and the strawberry crop suffered an invasion. Reluctantly indeed were the last stragglers taken on board until the next resting point which was well down the Skeena at Sunnyside Cannery.

Here the whole staff of the cannery remained at their posts and the whole process of canning was demonstrated. The fish were taken from the boats, put through the machines, canned and wrapped. The appealing feature, however, was that every person received a souvenir can of salmon which they had seen in the process of preparation. Mr. Lett thanked the officials at the cannery and J. F. Strang replied in a very suitable manner. All was now settled for the last hour's run into the terminus.

This morning the excursionists were the guests of the Grand Trunk Pacific Steamship Company on the Prince Albert. Leaving the Grand Trunk dock at 9 o'clock they were taken about the harbor and over to Georgetown. On their return they were shown through the dry dock to see the ship building operations, many of them have never witnessed such before indeed, some of them had never seen an ocean vessel. This afternoon as guests of the Board of Trade, they are visiting the Prince Rupert Lumber Company's mill and the Canadian Fish and Gold Storage Company's plant. Tonight a dance is being given in their honor at St. Andrew's Hall.

#### TRADES CONGRESS MAY LAY DOWN ITS TOOLS

 LONDON, July 14.—The Trades Congress have passed a vote threatening to lay down their tools in an effort to force the Imperial Government to withdraw the troops from Ireland and grant that country an independent Irish parliament.

#### MOROCCO BECOMES MORE VALUABLE

PARIS, July 14.—Discovery of large deposits of phosphate in the Moroccan hinterland may soon make France the great phosphate producing country of the world. The Moroccan deposits are reported by Professor Louis Gentil, of the Sorbonne, as being almost inexhaustible. One hundred miles inland from Casablanca there is a mountain plateau forty miles long and twenty-five miles wide which is a veritable storehouse of phosphate. A railway is to be built to this mountain and a monopoly has been given to the Moroccan Government for the sale of the phosphate. France already has huge deposits in Alsace.

#### TWO MILLION POUNDS WAS LANDED HERE

Halibut Totals Last Month Were Back to Normal, Exceeding Figures for Some Time.

With a fair supply of fish refrigerator cars throughout the month of June, the fish business passing through local concerns during the month just passed reached normal again when the net total of halibut passing over the local wharves reached 2,291,000 pounds. The figure is the largest recorded in one month for some time and is the source of gratification to those connected with the fish business in the city. It exceeds the total for the month of May which was 1,963,000 lbs., and also that of June, 1919, which was a landslide month both from a fishing standpoint and also on account of market conditions, that month being characterized by a severe car shortage when only 581,500 pounds were landed here and 748,500 sought market at other points. This June only 86,000 pounds went south for sale.
