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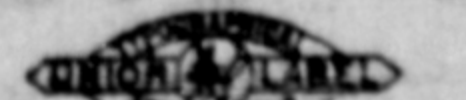

Good Crops and Economic Conditions.

From all parts of the Dominion come most promising reports as to the condition of various crops and all forecasts are that crops will be exceptionally large and in many cases record breakers. There has been no time in the history of the Dominion or of the world that such production has been so necessary and it is nothing short of a providential blessing that the country now has such assurance. Many persons of authority who are in positions to know state that the coming winter is to be a very hard one but the prospects of good harvests should modify the other forecasts and alleviate the suffering that, no doubt, will be felt. The fact that there is plenty of wheat, fruit and vegetables to go around is one of the controlling factors in the economic conditions of a country. If Canada this year produces the looked for bumper crops there should be little to fear for the winter.

Ministers' Salary Question.

The Dominion Methodist Ministerial Support Committee is at the present time making an energetic effort to put the salaries of the ministers on a better basis by having them raised somewhat in proportion with living costs. The Labor Gazette issued by the Dominion Government shows that the main items in the domestic budget have gone up 100 per cent, whereas, the salaries of ministers have gone up only 30 per cent since 1914, despite the fact that they were inadequate then. Many churches are, in fact, paying the same salaries as before the war and are thus entailing great hardship on the families of the ministers. Church members never were so numerous and so prosperous as they are today and never so able to pay adequate salaries to the men who stand for the best things in the life of the community. Although the present conditions may be due, more or less, to thoughtlessness it should be possible to show more active appreciation of the vital part played by the minister in the work of nation building.

Gypsies and Horse Dealers.

According to a press despatch from Kingston, an Odessa citizen has committed suicide because of despondency, following a horse trade with a gypsy. Despondency usually follows horse trades with gypsies, but most men succeeded in living down the fit of depression, and there is no job for the undertaker, though the gypsy's life may be in jeopardy for some time. The man who makes an exchange of horses with a gypsy, in the hope of benefitting himself, should try something easier, beginning first by going to a circus or fair and attempting to beat the nut-shell game. — Smith's Falls Record News.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

BECKETT BEATS TOMMY BURNS

Former Resident of Prince Rupert Was Trying to Match with Jack Dempsey.

LONDON, July 17.—Joe Beckett the English heavyweight, defeated Tommy Burns in the seventh round here last night. Burns was seeking to stage a come-back and a possible match with Jack Dempsey for the world's title.

Thirteen Years Older.

LONDON, July 17.—Tommy Burns, former heavyweight champion pugilist of the world, failed in his comeback against Joe Beckett, mainly on account of his age. Burns' fighting was very sluggish and he quit in the 7th round protesting a decision and then stopped the fight which was scheduled for twenty rounds. Burns is thirteen years older than Beckett.

SQUEALLESS PIG THEFT

Tactful Thieves Remove Them Without Disturbing Owners.

"Squealless pig-stealing is an art alleged to have been indulged in by two brothers, Percy and Norman Wilson of Toronto, who were arrested recently by detectives in that city.

During the dark hours one morning six pigs disappeared from the piggery of W. Harris & Co., Ltd., Danforth avenue; in the stable yard next morning was found a set of harness which the night before had been carefully hung in its accustomed place in the stable; a horse in a near-by field showed signs of having den a hard night's work, while a wagon, of the nature usually used for transporting live stock, was found to have mysteriously moved a few yards during the night. For all these unusual things the Wilson brothers are alleged to have been responsible.

It is said that the men first took the horse from the field, and after procuring harness by breaking into the stable, drove the animal a quarter of a mile north and hitched it to a farmer's wagon. Returning with their equipage, they are believed to have broken into the slaughter-house so as to provide a runway for the pigs to a loading platform, and in this manner to have loaded the porkers without giving them cause to squeal.

Having safely loaded the animals it is charged that the men drove them to Scarborough, and the next day hired a truck to remove them once more to the city. Then, it is further charged, the animals were sold, live weight, to a packing house for the sum of \$240.

The condition of the wagon, the horse and the harness when found is explained by the courtesy of the pig-stealers in returning them all to their owners.

NOTICE TO REAL ESTATE AGENTS AND SALESMEN.

Under the provisions of The Real Estate Agents' Licensing Act, 1920, which became effective July 2nd, 1920, every Real Estate Agent and Salesman operating within the Province shall take out a licence. Section 4 of said Act provides that no person shall act, or offer, or undertake to act as a Real Estate Agent or Salesman in this Province without first having applied for and obtained a licence.

Penalty for non-compliance with provisions of this Act is a fine of not less than fifty dollars and not more than five hundred dollars.
