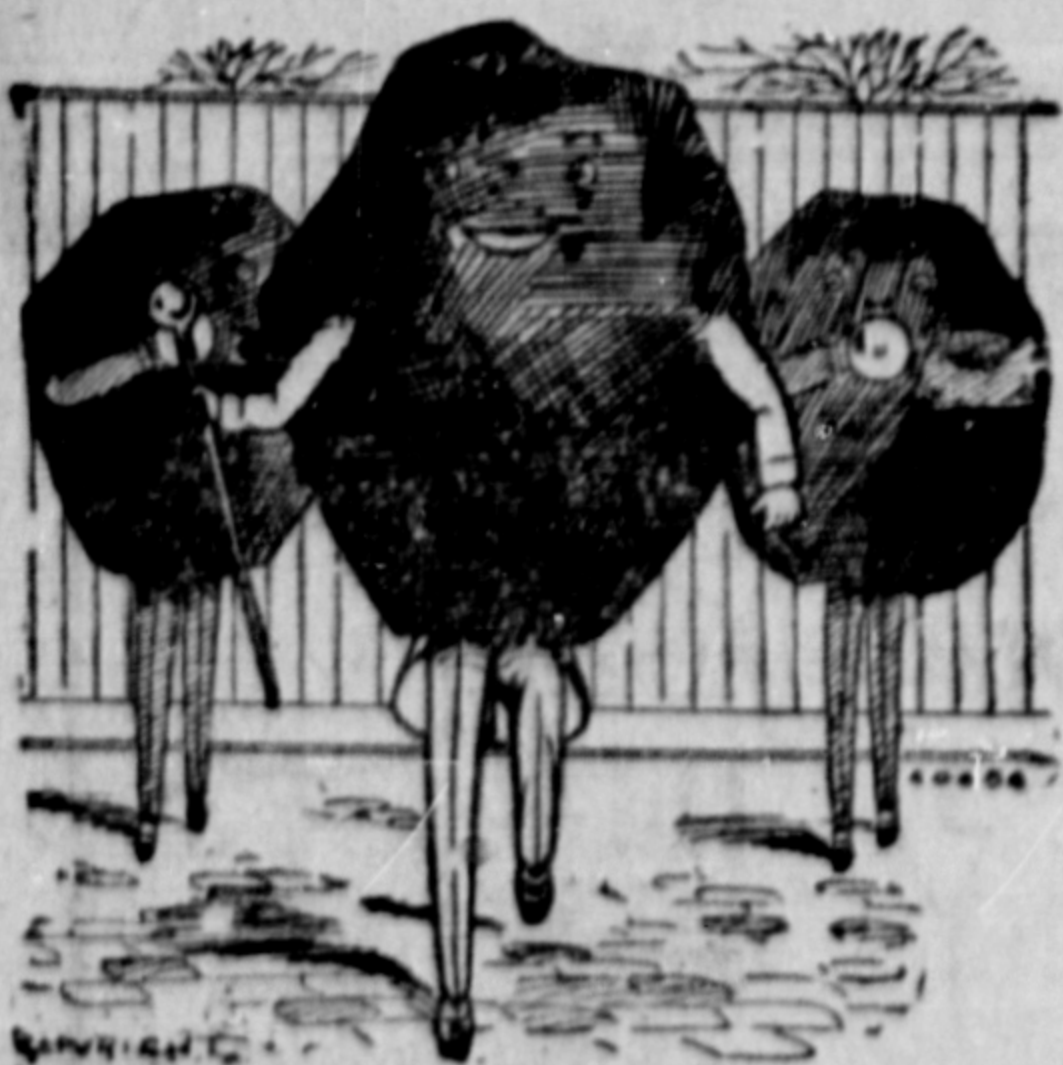

**CREW OF STEAMER
REFUSE TO BATHE**

BOSTON, July 17.—The White Star liner *Cretic* has been held at quarantine since Friday because the crew refuse to be washed. The detention involves 1,153 steerage passengers and is costing the company about \$20,000 a day. First class passengers were allowed to land without bathing.

The trouble grew out of the fact that the port authorities at Naples recently refused to allow American health officials to examine emigrants. As a result no clean bill of health could be given the *Cretic* here.

**CONSCIENCE PRICKED SO
BANK CLERK CONFESSED**

Said He Stole \$25,000 and Played Chicago Cabarets.

CHICAGO, July 17.—The story told the police by Charles E. Brierley, a trusted employee of the Thomas J. Lipton Company, of how he stole \$70,000 from his company over a period of years and put the totals in a little "hell book" that remained to torment him, affected Axel Hedberg, former lieutenant of the Swedish Royal Guards, very deeply.

He read the story over and over, he told the police Wednesday night. The pricking of conscience, the sleepless nights described by Brierley, were no strangers to him, he said. He had stolen \$25,000 from the Union Bank of Chicago he voluntarily confessed. Hedberg had been known as the "Count" in the gayest night resorts. He was a \$125 a month teller.

"I spent hundreds of dollars every night," he confessed, according to the police. "After my wife died I didn't care. The money went in the cabarets and to the women I met. I don't know their names. You can always find them in the cafes. When I read Brierley's story it got me to thinking. I know all he suffered. I did as he did. I went to William Tholin, the assistant cashier and blurted out the truth."
