## The One Cure

### For the Sick Man.

For years before his deposition by the Young Turks, Abdul the Damned was frequently spoken of as the "Sick Man of Europe." Physically he was a miserable ailing, fretful individual and his characteristics became those of the Empire he misruled with such success. His nickname became allegorically that of his country. For years his neighbors told old Abdul how a cure might be effected of the ills troubling his people. But instead of taking any one of the medicines, Abdul preferred to mix his drinks and took a little of the proffered cures from each of his obliging neighbors. Needless to say the result of the mixture was satisfactory to no one, it affected Abdul not one whit, left him no worse, but if anything seemed to cause him intense amusement it was listening to the claims of the medicine prescribers, each of whom claimed credit for some invisible improvement in the patient's condition. Inciting the jealousies of the physicians was the favorite occupation of the neurotic Abdul and he became an adept in the gentle art of setting his western neighbors by the ears.

### Now is the Time For Heroic Measures.

They will either have to obey the treaty of Versailles to the letter or they will be thrown out of Europe, bag and baggage. If this takes place there will be few regrets. Heretofore each European country was withheld from direct action against Turkey by the mutual jealousies of the powers. Now when the sole power in Europe is the Supreme Allied Council this sore spot which has been a source of infection for all Europe for generations, ought to have a major operation which is about the only thing from which will result health.

### To be Sold.

It is a pity that the Dominion Government cannot be persuaded to turn over the old cruiser Rainbow for the use of the Boys' Naval Brigade as a training ship, says the Victoria Times. In the meantime there is a possibility of its disposal as junk after the machinery has been dismantled. Canada's merchant marine of necessity must depend upon her ability to provide the men with which to man the national fleet. Ships always can be built in a few months, but it takes a good deal longer to turn out the seamen. Little expense need be involved in the maintenance of the Rainbow for the coming mariners. She would be stationary and her adoption for training purposes would make possible a considerable extension of the Boys' Naval Brigade movement to which this country must look for her sailors in the future.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

## SECOND RACE CALLED OFF

Second Calm Tied Both Boats up  
So Impossible to Finish  
Within Six Hours.

SANDY HOOK, July 19.—After the Resolute had kept ahead and gained five miles in the course of her forward spurt over the Shamrock, Saturday's great yacht race was called off for the boats could not finish within the specified six hours time limit, as the Resolute, though far ahead, has already taken over three and a half hours to complete half of the course.

At the ten mile mark the Resolute was one mile ahead of the Shamrock. Completing half of the course, the Resolute was five miles ahead but before 5:45 the Shamrock had picked up three miles.

The race was finally called off when it was seen that it would be impossible to complete before 8:45, both boats drifting in a dead calm at the time of calling the race off.

## DOCTOR TREMAYNE IS ESTABLISHED AGAIN

Dr. H. E. Tremayne who became so familiar a figure in the history of the early days of Prince Rupert, has again opened up an office here after an absence of some four years. The doctor is delighted to be back with so many old friends and naturally, during the past few days, many of his old practice have returned. Mrs. Tremayne and family will arrive from the south in a short time and will make their home here.

When Dr. Tremayne first came into this northern country in 1905 his medical duties held him in the village of Metlakatla which at that time was a flourishing centre. In the fall of 1906 he came to Prince Rupert and remained here throughout the construction period. During this time he won a host of friends—professionally and otherwise—and the Tremayne children were great favorites with everyone and familiar figures about the young city.

In the fall of 1916 the doctor joined up for service with the forces overseas and in the month of October left the city to take up his military duties. Following a splendid career while helping the boys at the front the doctor returned to British Columbia in June, 1919, and received an appointment to the pension board. He served in this capacity with headquarters at Victoria until ready to come north. Now Dr. Tremayne is again enjoying Prince Rupert's balmy climate where he feels more at home than anywhere else.

## NOTICE TO REAL ESTATE AGENTS AND SALESMEN.

Under the provisions of The Real Estate Agents' Licensing Act, 1920, which becomes effective July 2nd, 1920, every Real Estate Agent and Salesman operating within the Province shall take out a license. Section 4 of said Act provides that no person shall act, or offer, or undertake to act as a Real Estate Agent or Salesman in this province without first having applied for and obtained a license. Penalty for non-compliance with provisions of this Act is a fine of not less than fifty dollars and not more than five hundred dollars.

Application for licenses must be made to Government Agents or Collectors throughout the Province.
