



REGINA LEADER EDITOR WITH RED CROSS NOW

REGINA, July 21.—Wm. Franklin Kerr, editor of the Regina Leader for 19 years, has announced his retirement from journalism to accept the appointment to the position of Red Cross commissioner of Saskatchewan.

Mr. Kerr was a member of the staff of the Free Press when, at the invitation of Hon. Walter Scott, he went to Regina in February, 1902, to take over the management of the Leader, then a weekly.

During the first Saskatchewan provincial election of 1905—and a stirring affair it was—the Leader branched out as a daily, and it has been such ever since, at one time, prior to the war, publishing both morning and evening editions. Mr. Kerr has been prominent in many movements for the public good as a citizen of Regina, and resident of Saskatchewan.

CITIZENS SAY WHISKEY SOLD OPENLY IN HULL

Nearly One Hundred Blind Pigs in Operation—Conditions Alarm Officials.

OTTAWA, July 21.—The liquor traffic in the city of Hull since the granting of beer and wine licenses by the Quebec Provincial Government at the instance of the Hull City Council, is proving anything but satisfactory to the citizens at large, it being claimed that the illicit sale of strong liquor is being conducted almost at liberty in every section of the city.

Whiskey, gin and other intoxicating liquors, the sale of which is prohibited, except under a medical certificate to the government licensed vendors, is sold openly in most of the licensed hotels, it is claimed, while there are said to be nearly 100 blind pigs in operation. In addition to five hotels and three retail stores for the sale of liquor, there are more than twenty wholesale beer and wine stores, and to make matters worse, the City Council has sanctioned the operation of seven club licenses.

"Conditions are reaching the stage where something drastic will have to be done," said Alderman Taylor, "if the illicit sale of liquor is to be put a stop to."

One morning there were no fewer than twenty-two individuals before Recorder Desjardins, charged with inebriation, seven of whom paid \$124 in fines, while the other fifteen went to jail at the expense of the corporation. This is not an unusual number, but something like a fair average of the drunks daily arrested.

MACKENZIE KING TO GET BIG RECEPTION

Vancouver Liberal Association Plans Monster Picnic in September.

VANCOUVER, July 22.—The Liberals here have decided to hold a monster picnic upon the occasion of the visit of Mackenzie King in September. It will be the first public visit of the Liberal leader to this city and great efforts will be put forth to make every event during the visit as entertaining as possible.

BLIGHTING HAIL IN THE PALOUSE VALLEY

Lewiston and Section South of Spokane Has Stones Large Enough to Kill Chickens.

LEWISTON, Idaho, July 22.—Chickens were killed by the extremely large hail stones that fell here during early today. It is reported that extensive damage has been done to crops, the loss in the orchards being estimated at \$200,000.

SAILED FOR NORTH ON SECRET MISSION

Slave Maddison, Vancouver Diver, Left in Gas Boat with Salvage Crew and Gear—Destination Unknown.

VANCOUVER, July 22.—With stories of sea-hidden treasure on the lips of waterfront salts, Steve Maddison, well known Vancouver diver, sailed last week for an unnamed spot north of the Queen Charlotte Islands in the little gas boat Delmartin, purchased from the Seattle Packing Company.

Mr. Maddison located three wrecks on the west coast of Vancouver Island last year, one of them reported to be the hulk of H.M.S. Condor, which disappeared about twenty-five years ago with all hands and left no trace of her fate.

No intimation of the destination of Delmartin was given. She carried a salvage crew and gear.
