First Ambassador To Germany.

Almost exactly twelve months after the signing of peace, a British Ambassador is accredited to Berlin. Lord D'Abernon is an experienced public servant, 63 years of age, known to the British public during the past five years chiefly as chairman of the Central Control Board, which established the elaborate system of liquor restrictions and the experiments in State management. In early manhood Lord D'Abernon (then Sir Edgar Vincent) was British representative on the Council of the Ottoman Debt, becoming in 1883 financial adviser to the Egyptian Government. He entered Parliament as a Unionist, but left his party on the Free Trade issue. It is announced that the appointment is temporary, and that the choice fell upon D'Abernon mainly because the Embassy work will for a time be dominated by economic questions. — London Times.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.
The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.
The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

TO GRAZE DEER IN BAFFIN LAND

Steffansson, Explorer, Has Leased Large Strip for Thirty Years.

OTTAWA, July 22.—That portion of the southern half of Baffin Island south of parallel 68 degrees north latitude, including a strip ten miles wide along the north boundary of Lake Nettilling, is to be leased to Vilhjalmur Stefansson, Canadian Arctic explorer, for the purpose of grazing herds of reindeer and muskox for a period of thirty years, with a period of renewal not to exceed twenty years to be provided for. This is authorized in an Order-in-Council just gazetted. Mr. Stefansson is to be given free grazing privileges for fifteen years, after which he will pay an annual rental of \$11,390.
Mr. Stefansson has represented to the government that he has interested sufficient capital to assure of the enterprise being successfully carried out.

as plans can be prepared. At the present time I cannot see my way clear to recommend the construction of an hotel on account of the large expenditure that would be required toward the construction of permanent facilities and for the time being that will have to be withheld. The road bed will also have to be put in shape, necessitating the spending of large sums of money but when I come back here as I wish to do at some date in the course of the next few months, I hope that the work we will have caused to be done will be such that you can say we kept our promises."

Agrees with Minister.
Mr. Hanna spoke briefly stating that it was his first visit to Prince Rupert but that he hoped it would not be his last. He agreed with the minister of railways that facilities were required and as far as he was concerned in his connection with the Canadian National lines, he would do all in his power to remedy the situation at the earliest possible date.

Colonel Peck.
Colonel Cy Peck was called by the mayor and made a humorous little speech. He had been making some promises and he had delivered the goods. He promised to get the ministers to come here and here they were. "Now it's up to you," he said. The Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine, is expected to be here next month and Dr. Tolmie, minister of agriculture, later and probably also the prime minister. Referring to Mr. Hanna and his Scottish accent, Col. Peck, although not Scotch himself, had seen a whole lot of them, at the front in the Canadian Scottish, and thought that this would be a good name for one of his government steamers now building.

A vote of thanks was moved by President Parker of the Board of Trade, seconded by T. D. Pattullo, after which the meeting dispersed thoroughly satisfied with the frank manner in which the visitors had discussed the situation.

NOTICE TO REAL ESTATE AGENTS AND SALESMEN.

Under the provisions of The Real Estate Agents' Licensing Act, 1920, which became effective July 2nd, 1920, every person desiring to act as a Real Estate Agent or Salesman operating within the Province shall take out a licence. Section 4 of said Act provides that no person shall act, or offer, or undertake to act as a Real Estate Agent or Salesman in this province without first having applied for and obtained a licence.
Penalty for non-compliance with provisions of this Act is a fine of not less than fifty dollars and not more than five hundred dollars.
