**Mining News**

Last week Messrs. Dyson and Osborne were in Prince George on the way south to the Soda Creek district where they will look over the land holdings of the Yorkshire and Canadian Trust Company. Recently they have been in the Copper River district where they report very favorably on the coal fields there. A diamond drill has been on the property for some time but has never been assembled. The National Finance Company of Vancouver are reported to own two thirds of this valuable coal field. The government report of 1914 by the minister of mines shows that the coal assays about 56 per cent fixed carbon. The development of this great coal area described as two miles wide by five miles long would wonderfully assist in the growth of industry along the line of the G. T. P. There has been considerable discussion in the city in regard to opening up a steel industry here as the iron ore deposits occur in the same area. At the opening of the Great War Alvo von Alvensleben had an option on the property but when this fell through it came into the hands of the National Finance Co.

Situated about the Big Salmon or McGregor river, near Prince George, the Hole in the Wall claims staked about a year ago by James Porter, George Hughes and Peter Framstead are beginning to show good promises for development. A few days ago a number of samples were brought into Prince George. These samples carrying copper, gold and silver were taken from an outcrop that showed up in the stripping operations. Considerable work has been done by the prospectors lately and the ore outcrops in two places about 600 feet apart. In the very near future a competent engineer will be brought in to make estimates of the prospect. The showing is sufficiently good to warrant a thorough investigation. The claims are very handy to the river which would furnish both transportation and water power.
