

Government Liquor Sale Would Debase Politics

Tom Richardson in Address here Urges that Workingmen Support Prohibition as Liquor Interests Inherent Enemies

"If all the resourcefulness of the liquor interests had been requisitioned they could not have produced a proposal more threatening than the one suggested. The proposal leaves untouched the important question of importation and manufacture. It leaves the sale of liquor in the hands of a government vendor and all purchases would require to be made from the government." So said Tom Richardson, formerly member of the British Parliament, who addressed a rather sparse meeting at the McIntyre Hall last night on the question of prohibition.

Mr. Richardson suggested that the tendency of government control of liquor sales would tend to debase politics, which even now was bad enough. He showed how strong the liquor interests were in the Old Country, so strong that they were able to control the policy of Premier Lloyd George contrary to his principles and to his expressed opinion when he declared that the liquor traffic was the greatest enemy Britain possessed. During the war those interests were willing to sell out for £100,000,000 but now they had increased their demand to £1,200,000,000, or an advance of 300 per cent.

The speaker declared that the revenue effect was demoralizing. Instead of turning to government sale of liquor he would advise that prohibition was enforced.

Moderation League.

Referring to the claims of the Moderation League and the Liberty League, Mr. Richardson asked had they ever heard of the liquor interests being on the side of the workingmen. The liquor interests, he declared, had always been the inherent enemy of the classes. The workingmen were painfully sensitive of the fact that they were inherent enemies. Why then this newborn interest in the workingmen. Now they were told it was a crime to rob the workingman of his beer. "Did booze ever help them to get shorter hours or more money," he asked. "It was always the reverse."

Inherent Enemy.

The claim that the liquor men were friends of the workers was an unwarranted one and not according to fact. The representatives of labor were with prohibition in the SUPREME COURT OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Many employers were against prohibition because they were becoming more respectable and more intelligent. In Kamloops the lumber workers had taken a petition to the mayor and council and he had been proud to join the delegation demanding the enforcement of the prohibition act in its entirety. He had not touched a single industrial centre where the leaders of labor were not in favor of prohibition and there was a distinct growth among the rank and file of the sentiment that drink was their inherent enemy.

Mr. Richardson asked for an increased majority in favor of prohibition at the plebiscite which was to be taken. This would not solve the world problems, but a sober democracy would be a step forward in the cause of progress and it would make for justice and world peace.

Sober Democracy.

In his opening remarks Mr. Richardson said that drink was not the cause of all poverty nor would doing away with it solve all their problems. A sober people was an intelligent people that would do its own thinking. Democracy was destined to rule the world but until they had an intelligent democracy with disciplined minds they could not reach that position.

Mr. Richardson dealt with some of the reasons given by people why they would not vote for prohibition. He showed that unless they continued the prohibition policy they could not cut off importation. He said no one would suggest that the prohibition law had been well administered. It was a public scandal, and many prohibitionists were feeling sore and disappointed. The law was an imperfect one, in fact, he could have drawn a better one himself. It was imperfect and immature. They must remember however that governments think in terms of the minimum and not the maximum. The mining laws in the Old Country were not well administered, but that was no reason why they should have no mining laws. What they had to do was to create a public sentiment in favor of it. Instead of voting against the act they should determine that it must be properly administered.


