Second Year Under Present Management.

The second year of this paper under the present management has been completed and we are now entering on the third. From the first the paper has been aggressive in matters pertaining to the improvement of the city. This policy will be continued. What we aim to do is to make an interesting newspaper, and we know we are doing that because our circulation has increased 150 per cent in two years. Part of that increase has been due to the increase in population in the city, and part to the fact that subscribers are getting the news they want and the general tone of optimism which makes for improvement.

Look Forward, Not Backward.

It is useless to look backward except to learn lessons for the future. We look to a prosperous future. We have learned certain lessons from experience and hope to benefit by them. So it will be with the city. Lessons have to be learned and often it is the expensive lesson of experience.

There is much to do in the city. There will have to be a cleaning up process sooner or later, and there will have to be many improvements such as better paved streets, better sewers, finer buildings, more institutions for the improvement of the physical and mental standards of the citizens.

Public Library Badly Needed.

One institution that should be established this autumn is a public library. It is needed badly here, and it should not be difficult to secure. Even now we understand there is a movement being set afoot with that end in view and anything the News can do to forward it will certainly be done.

The ideal is that every person should own a good library of his own. It has been proved that a public library is a stimulus to book buying and that the person who reads books borrowed from a library likes to have copies of favorite authors to which he may turn at any time.

Thanks to Those Who Have Aided.

The News takes this occasion to thank all those who have aided in making the paper what it is, whether it be employees, advertisers or readers. Nothing can be done without co-operation.

It is often a matter for regret that we are not able to buy a more complete telegraph service in order to better serve the public here. In time this will come, but telegraph tolls are high and the paper has to pay its way, else it will go out of business. That is inevitable with any paper.

Today we are increasing the subscription rates to a dollar a month to those in the city. In the Alaskan towns the rates are from a dollar to a dollar and a quarter, and the man on the street pays ten cents. Here, however, we shall continue the street sales at five cents. We strongly advise readers to become subscribers as sometimes the edition is sold out before all are supplied on the street. On Saturday, for instance, there was a run on the paper, more than four hundred being sold on the street alone.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

LUXURY AND EXCISE TAXES TO BE PAID

Regulations Issued as to Dates of Making Returns to Government Collector.

The collector of inland revenue announces that the returns of the luxury tax must be made to the local collector on the first and fifteenth days of each month and the returns of the jewellers, manufacturers and sales tax must be made not later than the last day of the month following the month covered by the return. Returns in regard to arrears of taxes must be made at once.

J. H. McLeod, the local collector, can give any further information in regard to the payments. It is announced by advertisement that any infraction of the regulations will be punished by inflicting the penalty provided.

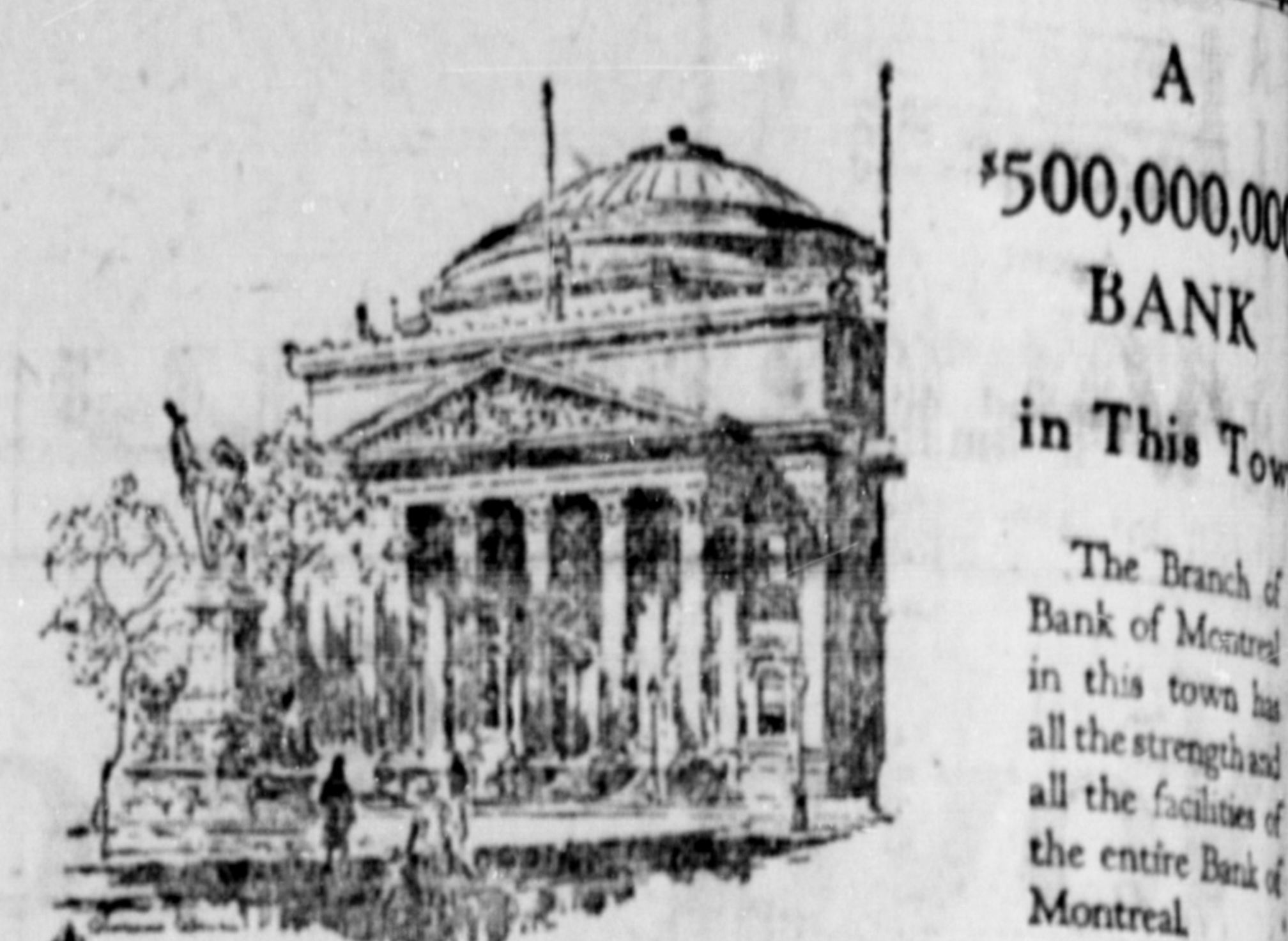
