Children Charged With Burglary.

It is difficult to know just what to do with children who commit serious crimes such as burglary. Often they have been brought up without proper parental restraint and the result is that the state has to step in and take them in hand.

There is no juvenile court in Prince Rupert where children can be tried without their appearing alongside hardened criminals and with all the publicity that goes with the ordinary court trials. At Vancouver and Victoria and we believe in other cities, there is a juvenile court and all trials are held in camera and the newspapers are forbidden to publish the names of the youngsters.

The children are usually not really criminals. Their activities have been misdirected. They are playing a game. Later the same youngsters may develop into splendid men and women if placed amid proper surroundings. Any stigma placed upon them in their youth may injure them as they grow older.

Arouse Interest In Navy League.

An effort is being made to arouse interest in this province in the work of the Navy League. This institution is raising funds for the relief of British and Canadian sailors and their dependents, to keep up sailors' homes, institutes and hospitals. It also encourages the establishment of volunteer naval brigades for boys and young men in which they can receive training to prepare them for service in the mercantile marine. The policy of the league is as follows:

1. To disseminate among the people of Canada a knowledge of the necessity and use of sea power as the keystone of Empire and National defence and commercial prosperity.
2. The advocacy of a policy that Canada shall assume her proper share of the cost and maintenance of protecting her own trade routes and coast defences.
3. The advocacy of a marine policy that will tend to build up our mercantile tonnage.
4. The advocacy of the establishment of a naval reserve force composed of Canadian officers and men who have served either in the Imperial or Canadian Naval forces.
5. The support of all just claims of officers and men of the Royal Canadian Navy and its auxiliaries with regard to pay and pensions, and that merchant officers and men in times of war be put on an equal footing with regard to pay and pensions with officers and men of the Royal Canadian Navy.
6. The support of sailors' Institutes in Canadian ports to better the conditions of the merchant seamen when ashore.
7. The application of steady pressure upon Parliament and the Government for the most efficient administration of the Department of Naval Service, and the abandonment of the present system of the portfolio of Marine, Fisheries and Naval Defence being under one minister.
8. The application of steady pressure upon all citizens enjoying the Canadian Franchise to see to it that our public men and members of Parliament shall insist upon the administration of our maritime policy being free from partisan action.
9. The encouragement and extension of Naval Colleges and of the Boys' Naval Brigade movement, and the establishment of proper training institutions, with a view to the preparation of boys and men for a sea-faring career to the ultimate end that all Canadian ships shall be manned by British-born and the elimination of aliens from the Merchant Marine.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

Playing with ten men throughout they kept the play away from the Scotsmen and scored some fine goals. This completed the scores as the Callies could not break through in spite of the fine fighting spirit demonstrated by Harry Menzie, Bill Crisp, Darton and Wearmouth put up a splendid defence and Tabrum picked out a couple of dangerous ones towards the end.
