Probability of More Contracts.

It is probable that there will be more ship contracts, either following those already in hand or following them. Possibly both. At anyrate from the interview given the Daily News by W. T. Donnelly yesterday, it is clear that Newman Erb is working on the proposal and those in the know seem to think the prospects are good. Tankers are badly needed and apparently Mr. Erb has influence enough to pull some of the contracts here.

It must be quite clear to any thinking man that Mr. Erb did not put up the buildings at the drydock yard, install the big plant and pay \$70,000 for J. L. Mullen's interest just for the sake of finishing the two vessels now on the stocks. He must have intended to continue shipbuilding and have had some idea where he could secure contracts.

Expert Work Speedily Done.

The work of the local shipyard in repairing the Prince George has excited a good deal of favorable comment, not only here but in Vancouver. The work was done as quickly as any yard on the coast could have handled it and the work was not only mechanically perfect, but it looked well. Superintendent Pillsbury and his staff must feel pleased with themselves at their successful handling of the job. It is an indication that the local plant is now able to handle big work and will be able to compete against other yards.

Great Story of Daring Deeds.

The story of the taking of Zeebrugge as told last night by Lieut. Helmsing was an inspiring one. It gives us hope for humanity, for if British men can do such things in time of war, may they not be expected to stand for the right and noble, the brave and the true in time of peace?

Lieut. Helmsing is hoping that Prince Rupert will have a corps of naval cadets. There is a large one in Victoria and the boys have a splendid time. There seems no reason why we should not also have one here. Leaders and co-operation are the things necessary. The matter will doubtless be discussed at the meeting to reorganize the Navy League on Friday evening at the Court House.

Summer Resorts Near This City.

Few places have nearly so many excellent summer resorts as there are near Prince Rupert. Yesterday M. P. McGaffery told us of the wonderful Lakelse Lake resort where the hot springs are among the best on the continent. There are other places, not only along the railway but across on Queen Charlotte Islands. Mrs. Cotes when she was here thought the sandspit at Skidegate was the finest resort she had ever visited. Many people go to Masset Inlet to holiday and others visit the farming country in the Bulkley. Farther east are the Mount Robson and Jasper Parks. These are all available and some day will be part of the world's playground.

Taking Interest in Fall Fair.

Yesterday we announced that arrangements were complete for the bringing of aeroplanes here for the fair and also that E. E. Campbell, the well known sportsman and official at Anyox, had ordered the trophy to be competed for by the speed boat owners.

It is to be hoped that there will be several local boats in the speed boat race. Preparations are being made earlier this season than usual and it is possible that some craft will be ready to lift that silverware and prevent it going to the copper town. It would be a new experience for Prince Rupert to win a speed boat race.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

GOVERNMENT AT OTTAWA

Outlook Not Very Cheerful Says Ottawa Writer

OTTAWA, Aug. 5.—The Nova Scotia electors furnish food for a deal of political speculation at Ottawa. No one disguises the fact that the outlook is ominous for the present Federal Conservative Government. At the last Federal election in Nova Scotia twelve Unionists and four Liberals were returned. Of the latter two—Hon. W. S. Fielding and Hon. A. K. Maclean—have since reverted to their former party affiliation.

Of the twelve constituencies in the Province which in 1917 returned supporters of the Government, all went either to the Liberals or Farmers or Labor. The inroad made by the third party by electing thirteen members at one shot in a field where heretofore they have never had so much as a look-in causes some reflection as to how the Federal elections, when they come on, will be affected.

Not Inspire Confidence
The situation is one that is not calculated to inspire much optimism in the ranks of the Federal Government, though they are viewing it with what courage they can command and relying on the hope of being able to hold on for a couple of years. The idea is that meanwhile candidates may possibly become more favored, while the influence of the protected interests and their election time power is estimated at a probably exaggerated value.

One thing which in Government circles is described as "a pity" is the fact that Quebec, normally the most staid and conservative province of all, is hopelessly alienated under present conditions, with not the remotest prospect of being won over, despite the great industrial boom now in progress there, and the belief that this may favor the protectionist party. The province is unalterably hostile to the Union Government, but especially so to the new premier. Whether or not he deserves it, Mr. Meighen is the bete noir of Quebec.

By-elections.
The main question now is as to how long a general election can be avoided. If the plans of the Government carry there will be none for two years yet. Much, if not all, will depend upon the by-elections. Should the five seats return supporters of the Government, or even if they get part of them, it will be construed as a fresh mandate, especially if the somewhat refractory following in the House can be kept as intact under Mr. Meighen as under Sir Robert Borden in the last session. If the by-elections go against the Government, its friends will advise it to dissolve and go to the country before another session, figuring out that staying to the last would invite annihilation, whereas an appeal now might result in the return of at least a saving remnant.
