WHITE FISH SUPPLY IS BEING CUT DOWN

Government of Ontario Sells
Catch in Own Province Only

Having exceeded the Ontario
demand for whitefish, the Department
of Fisheries of the Ontario
Government has been obliged to
cut down production by the fisher-
men in Lakes Nipissing and
Nipigon. Half a ton a day has
been knocked off the catch for the
present and until the demand im-
proves and the catch of outside
and private fishing firms de-
creases.

The department easily disposes
of the surplus to the United
States, but such action is con-
trary to the policy which is to
supply Ontario people with fresh
fish at uniform and low prices.
The catch of whitefish has been
very good. The department has
been getting and selling about
2½ tons of whitefish and trout
every two days. Now it has taken
half a ton of whitefish off, but no
limit has been placed on trout, for
which there is a keen demand.

The Government fishing men in
Lakes Nipissing and Nipigon have
had a good season. A change of
policy this year does not allow the
department to buy from out-
side fisheries.

While supplying Ontario with
good and cheap fish, the depart-
ment must also attain another
object and that is to preserve the
fish. That is one of the reasons
why only the Ontario demand is
met and no attempt made to get
into the outside market. The
scarcity of trout in the two lakes
fished by the Government ham-
pers the sale somewhat. There
are no trout in Lake Nipissing
and only about one-quarter of the
fish caught in Nipigon are trout.
The fishermen are now reducing
the number of whitefish nets to
keep within the limits set by the
department.

JEWS' POSITION IN PALESTINE

Mon. A. J. Balfour and Lord Rob-
ert Cecil Address Zionist
Federation.

At a demonstration held at the
Albert Hall, London, under the
auspices of the English Zionist
Federation, to celebrate the ac-
ceptance by Great Britain of the
mandate for Palestine, Mr. Bal-
four said that for long he had
been a convinced Zionist, but in
his most sanguine moments he
never conceived the possibility
that the great work of Palestinian
reconstruction would happen so
soon. This was one of the great
and unexpected results of the
war. There were difficulties
ahead, among them the Arab
question. It would require tact,
judgment, and above all sym-
pathetic goodwill on the part of
both Jew and Arab.

He hoped they would remember
that while we desired under the
egis of Great Britain to establish
this home for the Jewish people
many of the Great Powers,
especially Great Britain, had
faced the Arab race from the
tyranny of their brutal conqueror
who had kept them under his heel
for many centuries. He hoped
they would not begrudge that
small notch in the Arab territory
being given to the people who for
hundreds of years had been
separated from it, but who surely
had a title to develop on their
own lines in the land of their
forefathers.

Great Adventure.

"We are embarked on a great
adventure," concluded Mr. Bal-
four, "and I say 'we' advisedly,
and by 'we' I mean on the one
side the Jewish people and on the other
the mandatory Power of Palestine.
We are partners in this great enterprise.
If we fail you you cannot succeed, if you
fail us you cannot succeed, but I
feel assured that we shall not fail us,
you, and that you will not fail us,
and if I am right, as I am sure I
am, in this prophecy of hope and
confidence, then surely we may
look forward with a happy gaze to
a future in which Palestine will
indeed, and in the fullest measure
and degree of success, be made a
home for the Jewish people."
(Loud applause.)

Dr. Charles Weizmann said
that the Jews reestablished in
Palestine would be a contribution
to the civilization of the world.

Outstanding Features.

Lord Robert Cecil said that
when the history of the war came
to be written he believed that the
two outstanding features of it
would be the establishment of the
national Jewish home and the
creation of the League of Nations,
and the two were not really dis-
connected. They represented two
great ideals for which we fought
and by which we conquered.

The Jews had in their hands
the success or the failure of one
of the greatest experiments that
had ever been tried. "We have
given you national existence," he
said. "In your hands lies your
national future." (Applause.)
