Coquitlam Fire Lesson to Us.

The Coquitlam fire should be a warning to Prince Rupert that every precaution must be taken to prevent an outbreak. In a city where the buildings are of wood it is so easy for a fire to get out of control.

Prince Rupert has been wonderfully free from big fires. The local fire department seems to have done effective work. They are out promptly at the first call and no fire has ever got out of hand, at any rate for many years past.

Grave Situation Regarding Poland.

The situation in regard to Poland is evidently very grave. The Bolsheviks of Russia are defying the League of Nations with the result that something has to be done to check them.

If there is to be a League of Nations that amounts to anything it must be effective. The Republican party in the United States suggest that moral force would be sufficient, but moral suasion has been tried so often and failed that it is evident some physical force must be used.

No one wants war. That is evident. Yet if Lenin and his hordes are to be allowed to overrun the world, there will be continuous fighting. The situation is most difficult and it will take the best men the Empire has to guide us safely through the crisis.

New General Management of Road.

The G. T. P. is passing under the same general management as the C. N. R. All the western lines of the Canadian National are to be in charge of A. E. Warren, who has been in charge of the C. N. R. There is no reason to think that this arrangement will be anything but to the advantage of both roads.

It is natural that local people should look somewhat askance at a man, who is practically a stranger here, controlling the transportation on which we depend. It will not take long, however, for Mr. Warren to get acquainted with us.

VOTERS HERE NUMBER 5,100

For the City Alone the Number Registered is 2,336.

Registrations for the Prince Rupert electoral district number in all approximately 5,100, and for the city of Prince Rupert 2,336. From this it will be seen that the city is almost half of the voting strength of the constituency.

It is estimated that the number of people living here, who are not Canadian citizens, numbers close on 800 and the number of children and others not old enough to vote is fully 1,000.

The Court of Revision is to be held here on September 13 in the Court House, when objection will be heard to any of the names on the list.

SOCKEYE CATCH IS UP TO AVERAGE OF OTHER FOURTH YEARS

The sockeye salmon pack on the Skepna River this year is well up to the record for previous seasons corresponding to this one. Four years ago the run was less than it has been in 1920.

The canners are not very keen on getting pinks this season as there is no market for them. If pinks were in demand the pack this year would be very large. As it is the price paid for these fish is low and not many, comparatively, are being caught.

NAVY LEAGUE IS TO REORGANIZE TONIGHT

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight. The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
