Would Welcome Visit From U. S. Vessels.

An effort is being made to induce one or more of the United States war vessels to come here to help celebrate the fair and carnival week. It is to be hoped that the effort will be successful. We are close neighbors of the United States and we have a great many American citizens in this city. We are always glad to see the four stacks of a U. S. destroyer drop anchor off the dock for we feel that we are receiving a visit from a cousin.

Most of the trouble that grows up between people and between nations is the result of not knowing each other. If we knew each other better we should be less inclined to quarrel. There would be less bitterness between us.

In the United States there is a little group that is always taking a dig at everything British. On this side there are some who laugh or sneer at anything Yankee. Association and intermingling will tend to eliminate these little annoyances. Let us be good neighbors. We come from a common stock and we speak the same language. Our ideals are alike and our hopes and aims are similar. The News will be glad to join with the rest of the citizens in welcoming the big boats if they see fit to come this way on our annual holiday.

Why Bitterness Between Opponents?

Why should there be bitterness between opponents. The true sportsman is one who admires his opponent if he is worthy and who is glad of the opportunity of entering the lists with him. In business the tendency is for members in the same line to get together. So it should be in politics, religion, and among nations.

As an example of the modern tendency in this regard the recently selected candidates for the United States presidency had some nice things to say of each other. Harding says of Governor Cox:

"I don't know what he thinks of me, but Cox is a shrewd man, possessor of great political wisdom, and has made a very able Governor of Ohio, whom the people like and approve. He has done many things in Ohio. Cox is smart. He understands politics. He makes a very impressive speech. I have great respect for his newspaper ability."

Here is what Governor Cox has said of Senator Harding:

"Harding is a man of great personal charm. Strange as his convictions may appear to me, he is perfectly sincere in his belief that the future welfare of the country lies in the custodianship of the Republican party under the policies which he represents. He is of the McKinley type, brought up on the Old Guard Republican faith. I respect his journalistic achievements, but we stand very far apart."

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same.

The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps.

Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
