Plenty of Scope for Community Work.

There is plenty of scope for an organization that is willing to do community work in this city. In the past there has been a good deal of public spirited effort to make conditions here better from a social point of view, but when one organization tires or loses its enthusiasm it is for another to take it up.

The head of the Elks order, when addressing the members and visitors at a banquet last night, spoke of the value of organized effort. He is right. Organized effort is one of the greatest factors in the life of any community. If the Elks can build up an organization that will work for the improvement of the community, they will have done a good deal. They will have justified their existence.

Unity of Action Always Admirable.

The despatches yesterday carried a short report of the condition in Europe, saying that Premier Millerand of France in a speech declared the Allies were still united in connection with the Polish situation. That is the great thing. As long as they can act in unison they will attain anything they are after. It was noticeable that it was only the day before yesterday that the United States made a pronouncement along similar lines.

There are times in every community when unity of action is necessary. There must be differences of opinion. There must be disagreements at times and sometimes there may be local strife, but the community that can concentrate and crystallize its effort on any one vital thing at a time is the one that will succeed.

Cow Bay Again Monday Night.

Now that an effort is being made to tackle courageously the Cow Bay question, the News would like to suggest that if anyone has any suggestion to offer in connection with it, that it be made at once. The meeting on Monday night may decide on nothing. At any rate it should be the means of shedding light on a good many phases of it. It may lead to a breaking of the present deadlock. The condition that exists now is not for the good of the city. Cow Bay is just now a plague spot. With a dilapidated roadway and a smelly environment it is not a credit to the city. Something should be done but just what that something is will be for the committee to advise. Those interested might do well to attend the meeting in the council chamber on Monday night and listen to the discussion as they will then be in a better position to know the present status. It is understood that the committee is getting all the preparatory information possible.

Must Be Alive Or Get Out.

There is one organization that will not carry dead wood. That is the Rotary Club. The members must attend meetings or have a real reason for being away. If they miss a certain number of lunches they are warned and if that is not effective they are dropped from the roll and their places filled.

In a small town it is difficult to do this, but it makes for efficiency in an organization. With the Rotarians it is not so much a matter of money as of service. There are a lot of societies that carry too much dead wood. Members who are not interested in an organization are usually better out of it altogether.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
