

Why in Favor Of Prohibition.

So many people have asked why the News favors prohibition as against government sale of liquor, that it might be in order to give a few of the reasons for that stand. It must be assumed as an axiom that liquor drinking is an evil, that it is bad for the race, and that it leads to other excesses. It seems quite unnecessary to prove that in the twentieth year of the twentieth century A. D. It is admitted so generally as to be almost accepted as a truth. It was very generally admitted by the electorate of this province when the last vote on the question wa taken.

Abolish the Bar No Longer an Issue.

The bar has been abolished and will remain abolished in so far as the sale of liquor is concerned. That seems so probable as to be almost certain. No one asks that it be brought back. The question now to come before the electorate is whether prohibition shall continue in its present form or the Provincial Government shall act as vendor and sell sealed bottles of liquor and other strong drink for beverage purposes at government liquor stores, there being no restrictions except that the liquor shall not be consumed on the premises where it is purchased.

If prohibition is allowed to continue, through the people voting in favor of it, the Provincial Government has promised to recommend to the legislature the passing of a resolution calling on the Dominion Government to prohibit importation of liquor into this province except for medicinal and similar purposes.

If the people vote in favor of government sale of liquor, it means that an immense quantity more liquor will be used than is used today. It will be a return to open legalized drinking. Anyone going for a picnic or any other outing will be able to take a bottle along. Bottles will be in evidence at dances and other entertainments and especially at election times. A large part of the evils, which have been partially removed by prohibition, will return. Such a condition we believe would not be for the benefit of even Prince Rupert.

Present Law is Not Enforced.

The present prohibition law is not enforced. No one will pretend that it is. People coming from Victoria say they can buy liquor at almost any bar in the capital city, and there is undoubtedly a large amount of liquor sold in Prince Rupert. Much of what is drunk here, however, is imported direct to the con-- sumer from outside the province and is quite legally used. If prohibition is continued, this will stop. If the law is changed it is impossible to secure a regulation against importing. At Vancouver those who go from here say they can easily get a drink. There are often drunken men to be seen on the streets here and complaint is made that the quality of the stuff that is illicitly sold is very poor.

Prince Rupert Not Typical of Province.

Prince Rupert is not typical of the whole province in regard to the liquor trade or in sentiment toward the Prohibition Act. Judging from associations with people in their homes, especially at Victoria, we should say there would be a large majority for prohibition when the next vote is taken. Even in Prince Rupert it is no criterion to judge from what is heard in pool rooms, bars or at cigar stores. Visit around in the homes and it is found Port Simpson both at springs and that sentiment is often very different, especially among women.

We are of opinion that prohibition will be supported again this year because it is in the interests of the business men to vote for it, the labor people are officially supporting it, the women are for it, and most people who are interested in the general betterment of the race and are 'not burdened with an overwhelming thirst would like to see liquor kept out as must as possible.
