VANCOUVER, August 19.—Before the eyes of thousands of people among whom was his own sister, Captain B. Brenton, purchasing agent of the Union Steamship Company of British Columbia, was last night drowned in English Bay when a Boeing aeroplane in which he was making a test flight for the obtaining of a commercial aviator's license, turned over at a height of 1,000 feet and threw him from the cockpit.

Captain Brenton was a native of British Columbia and before the war was employed by the B. C. Packers. He had a brilliant career overseas.

Flyers are Welcome at Hub of Klondyke

Presented with Gold Souvenirs inscribed by the Governor---Scheduled to Leave Dawson Today

DAWSON, August 19.—The New York to Nome planes were scheduled to leave here for Fairbanks at 9:30 this morning, weather permitting.

The flight from Whitehorse to Dawson was made at a height of 6,000 feet or slightly over a mile from the ground. Atmospheric conditions were excellent and a clip of ninety miles per hour was easily maintained.

Before passing over Skagway the flight along Lynn Canal from Wrangell was made at a low altitude.

Two of the aircraft arrived here the day before yesterday on the twenty-fourth anniversary of the big Klondyke gold discovery and a celebration was being held in the Arctic Brotherhood hall.

As a welcome to Dawson, each of the flyers was presented with a miniature gold pan filled with Klondyke nuggets and bearing the inscription of Governor MacKenzie.

WARSAW, August 19.—The Reds in a panicky flight have evacuated Brest-Litovsk and Warsaw is now considered safe. The Poles are advancing and have completely annihilated two Bolshevik divisions, making prisoners of 1,000 of the soviet soldiers.

WASHINGTON, August 19.—The American Government makes the announcement that it cannot, constitutionally, give aid to Poland, but, otherwise, will do all possible in the assistance of the oppressed country.

VETERAN WAS KILLED AT BELMONT MINE

Funeral of John P. Redding Took Place Under Great War Veterans' Auspices This Afternoon.

At two o'clock this afternoon the funeral of John P. Redding took place from the parlors of the B. C. Undertakers to Fairview Cemetery. Deceased was a returned soldier employed at Surf Inlet and interment was made under the auspices of the local G. W. V. A. Canon Rix officiated at the cemetery.

Mr. Redding was employed in the Belmont mine at the time of the accident and was crushed when a slope gave way. From the way in which his body was mangled a very great weight of rock must have fallen on the man. Very little information could be obtained of the man's relatives or his friends, but the returned button on his coat showed that he had been overseas with the Canadian forces. The body was brought north yesterday.

BIG ROBBERY BUCKLEY BAY

Two Ladies Lose Over Seven Hundred Dollars in Bank Notes and Express Orders.

POLICE WORKING ON CASE BUT NO CLUE YET FOUND

Two ladies were robbed of over seven hundred dollars on Tuesday night at Buckley Bay, according to a message which has been received by Provincial Police Chief A. C. Minty from Constable Ponder. The robbery is shrouded in mystery and no trace has yet been discovered of the thieves. The money taken is described as consisting of five hundred dollars in notes and \$150 in Dominion Express orders issued in Prince Rupert about three weeks ago in the name of Muriel Pye, one of the ladies who was robbed. Constable Ponder is working on the case from Buckley Bay.

The local office of the police has ascertained the numbers of the express orders as being from 875544 to 875547 as well as order number 29529. All the local banks, express offices and the city police have been apprised of the robbery but as yet no clue is forthcoming.
