SUFFERS INDIGNITIES

The Editor Daily News:

The other evening I was talking to a man in front of my place on Fraser Street regarding his going up the line to cook at my mine, when a police officer happened along that way. Seeing the man was holding a bundle of newspapers under his arm, this policeman took the bundle of papers and after examining them he said to me: "Is that the kind of booze you are selling, Nick?" The man with whom I was talking and whom I had practically engaged, wishing to avoid trouble left and although I have wanted him, I have been unable to locate him since.

Only yesterday afternoon the same constable entered my place on Fraser Street where three men were sitting at the table having a lunch. The constable made a search and then said: "Those men are not here to eat; they are here to drink booze."

Now I do not think such treatment as that is coming to any British subject. I have lived in Prince Rupert for over eleven years, have raised my children here and have tried to make an honest living, to which citizens, generally, can bear me out. It seems a shame that a citizen should be called upon to stand such treatment, but I do not intend to fight against it.

I am only going to say that if I am again subjected to any such indignity, it is my intention to leave the city with my family and move elsewhere where I may obtain fair treatment. I am an old timer here and had intended to make the place my permanent home, but I do not mean to be subjected to any such indignities.
