**COLONEL HIAM TO SAIL EAST THIS WEEK**

In Montreal Speaks of Astonishing Development of Portland Canal.

MONTREAL, Aug. 19.—Lieut.-Col. T. A. Hiam is staying at Place Viger Hotel, and sails on the Megantic for London on August 21. He will there take up the appointment in an advisory capacity to the transport commission of the League of Nations. Whether his duties will take him has not yet been disclosed, nor in fact does Col. Hiam know the exact nature of them. He has just arrived here from Vancouver. On being asked his opinion as to British Columbia institutions he replied that British Columbia is extremely prosperous.

"Mining activity in the Portland Canal district has been remarkable during this summer, and the wealth of the province is increasing by leaps and bounds," he said.

Colonel Hiam passed through Prince Rupert a few weeks ago on the Prince John en route south.

**PASSENGERS SAW SIGHT**

Prince George Struck Whale on a Recent Southbound Trip—Playing Directly in Course.

The sighting of whales on this coast in travelling between here and Vancouver is not unusual, but passengers on a recent trip of the Prince John southbound came in closer view of one of the finny monsters than is common.

The vessel had just passed through Queen Charlotte Sound on a fine afternoon when a young whale was seen playing near one of the small islands near the course. Of course it was watched and it continued its play of jumping completely out of the water every minute or two, unheeding the approach of the steamer. As the boat came closer the passengers became quite interested, when suddenly it made another jump out of the water directly before the prow of the steamer. Evidently seeing the approaching danger the big fellow swerved to one side, but not without hitting the boat a glancing blow.

Of course by that time everyone was at the side of the deck watching, but as soon as the vessel passed by the whale was seen to continue his play in the wake, shortly being joined by another of his species.

**OUIJA BOARD GIVES TROUBLE TO WOMAN**

MONTREAL, August 19.—An ouija board determined the action of a married woman with two children who consulted it before leaving England with her children to rejoin her husband in Toronto, the latter having preceded her to Canada. On reaching Canada she arranged to meet the steward when the boat came into Montreal harbor after its next trip. **GO TO ALASKA ON A HUNTING TRIP**

Hawaii Game Commissioner will Enjoy Sport in a Different Clime while Gathering Data

George C. Beckley, fish and game commissioner for Hawaii, accompanied by Dr. W. C. Hobdy and Mr. August Breier of Honolulu were in the city Monday on the S.S. Princess Alice en route for Alaska, where they will engage in an extensive game hunt. Their outfit consists of three Indian guides, 27 horses, a cook, horse-wrangler and a packer. They will hunt for six weeks in the wilds of Alaska for moose, caribou, bear and mountain sheep. The purpose of the expedition, as revealed to the World at Vancouver by Mr. Beckley, is to furnish data for the department, and also to acquire a group of species for the Bishop Museum in Honolulu. Their first stop is Wrangell, Alaska, from which they take a launch up the Stikine River, two and one-half days to Telegraph Creek, and on to Dease Lake, where they will make their permanent camp, penetrating inland from there 100 miles north to the game fields. Mr. Beckley has just finished a tour of hatcheries up the Pacific Coast. The hunters expect to come down from the north with abundant fruits for their labors.

"Gay Lord Quex" Tends to Audacious and is Mildly Daring

Gay bachelors, midnight parties, "other women," shadowy pasts, well seasoned with a dash of spice and mixed with a spoonful of happy complications, comprise one of the best entertainment concoctions seen here for many a day, and this is the show being shown at the Westholme Theatre tonight.
