Poles Charged with Delaying Peace

MINISTER OF MARINE AND FISHERIES WAS WELL RECEIVED IN THIS CITY

Six Divisions of Reds Surrounded

Polish Advance Still Continues and 15,000 Prisoners have been Taken; Wrangel Drives Reds across Dnieper River

WASHINGTON, August 21.—The report that Gen. Wrangel, anti-Bolshevik general of South Russia, had driven the Bolshevik armies across the Dnieper River has been confirmed and is official.

PARIS, August 21.—The French General Weygand is continuing the successful drive against the Bolsheviks who have been attacking Poland. Steady advances have been made since week-end when the wedge of the Red armies was driven from the northern suburbs of Warsaw.

Now the Bolsheviks are many miles away and they are making complaint that the Poles are dragging the armistice parley. The warships are en route to Danzig.

WARSAW, August 21.—The Poles have surrounded six divisions of Reds numbering 30,000 men. In the last week's recovery the number of prisoners estimated to have been taken reached 15,000. The French have sent congratulatory messages to the Poles on their victory.

ALASKA PLANES ON LAST STEP

Fairbanks Yesterday Afternoon to "Carry on" to Nome.

FAIRBANKS, August 21.—The three days stopover at Fairbanks of the transcontinental planes has been cancelled and, in the planes left yesterday at Fairbanks. On their arrival they were expected to leave this afternoon for Nome and complete the long flight from Fairbanks which has taken over a week.

NEW DESIGN CANADA YACHT

Providing Preliminary Plans in England and then Shipped to Canada

MONTREAL, August 21.—Captain John Lipton, the designer of the new Canadian yacht, has been asked to design the new yacht, Canada's challenger for the America Cup and has provided that the preliminary work be done in England, and the yacht can then be shipped to Canada.

ACT GOES INTO FORCE TODAY

Woman Gives Drink of Milk to Child and is Assaulted

ONTARIO, August 21.—The new act goes into force today. A woman who broke out in a rage when she saw a child being given a drink of milk to a child.

PRISON STRIKERS IN MARYLAND JAIL

BALTIMORE, August 21.—Fire was turned on hunger strikers who broke out in the State Penitentiary yesterday. They were shot in the chest and fought in the corridors with the warders.

PAYING FARES OF VICTORIA CROSS MEN TO TORONTO

OTTAWA, August 21.—The Dominion Government is to pay the fares of all Victoria Cross men in Canada who are to gather at Toronto when the Canadian National Exhibition opens on August 28.

Captain John McGregor, V.C., of this city, left on this morning's train to attend the gathering. Col. Peck, V.C., was unable to go east on account of the visit of the minister of marine and fisheries. He went south last night with Mr. Ballantyne on the Stadacona and is expected back in the course of a few days.

SAVED CHILD BUT DROWNED HERSELF

Wife of Winnipeg Clergyman Meets Fate in Lake of the Woods at Kenora

KENORA, August 21.—The wife of Rev. E. G. Perry, of Winnipeg, saved a child from drowning in the Lake of the Woods yesterday, but was herself drowned. They were forced into the water when the gasoline launch in which they were riding caught fire.

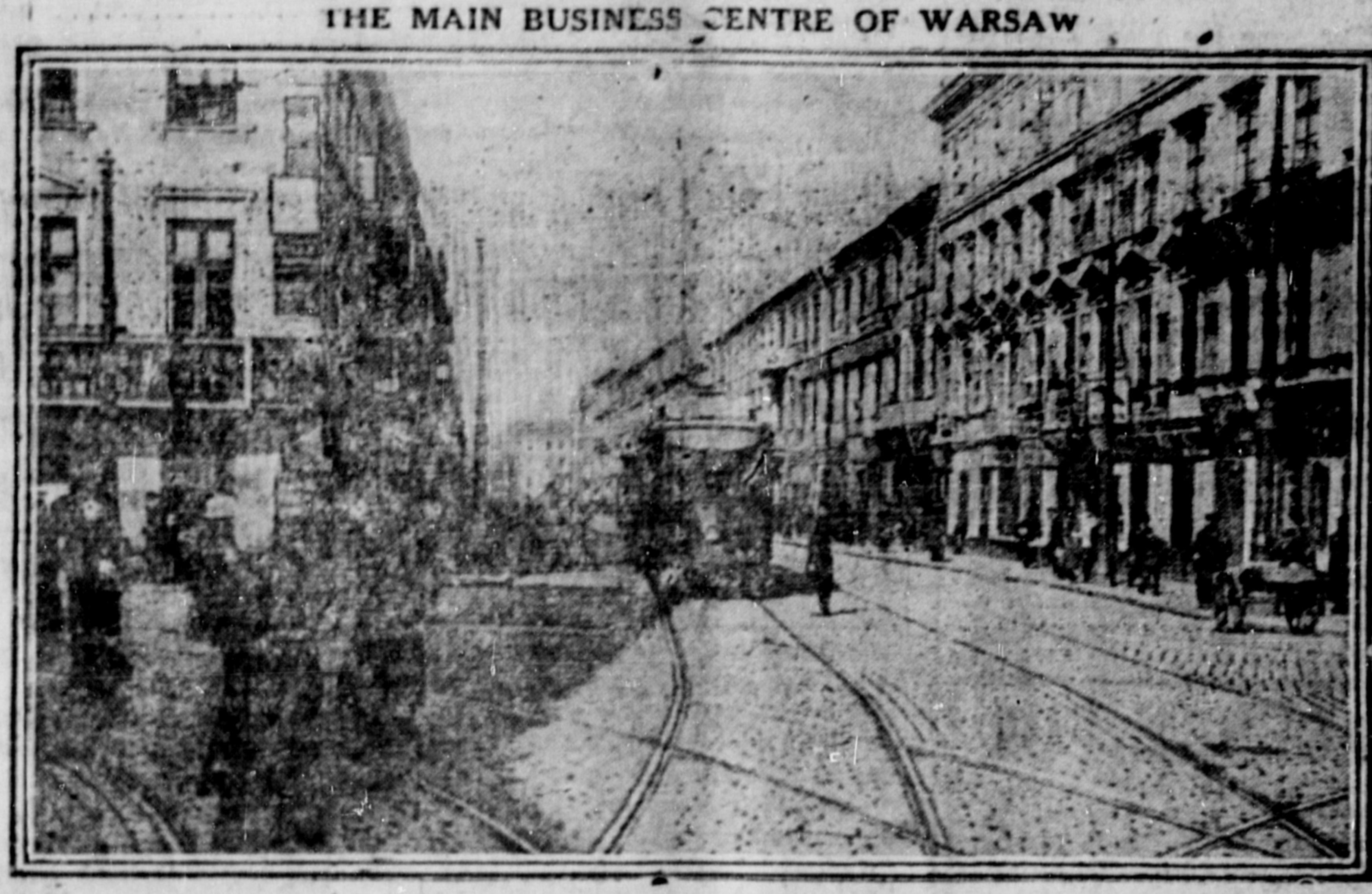
PRINCE HAS SAILED BY RENOWN TO SAMOA

WORK STARTS ON NEW DOCK

First Thing to Remove Mud—Thirty Men Now Working.

Actual operations have now commenced in connection with the new Grand Trunk dock. This morning the dredge Victoria was towed to position at the end of the present wharf and alignment has now been made with the surveyors' stakes. Cables have been run ashore and the anchor lines have also been made fast so that the only thing left now is for the mechanics to work the clam-shell and the mud will quickly vanish.

Removing Mud.

There are three mud areas in all which must be dredged. For the present the material will be lifted out of its present position and dumped further out in the harbor where there is plenty of depth and where the piles will not be driven. Arrangements have not yet been made with the harbor authorities as to where the balance of the material will be taken after it becomes necessary to load it on scows. The mud is being removed and sand will be substituted to give a firmer footing to the piles.

Two other dredges which will be engaged in taking out sand at Silver Creek, were due to leave Vancouver today for their northern destination. As soon as these arrive the work of filling in will commence and the number of employees will be quickly increased. At the present time there are about thirty men working on the dock. A number of these are mechanics on the dredge which will be operated with three shifts.

FUNERAL OF RAY CHAPMAN

Gathering Rivals That at the Reception of Cardinal Mercier in Cleveland.

CLEVELAND, Aug. 21.—There was a record assemblage of persons at the funeral of Ray Chapman, the Cleveland baseball star, today. The biggest crowd gathered at the cathedral that has been seen there since the visit of Cardinal Mercier. Chapman was killed as the result of a pitched ball in a ball game at the first of the week.

C. P. R. WOULD BOOST RATES BY \$22,000,000

OTTAWA, August 21.—The Canadian Pacific Railway Co. insists that it is necessary that the company increase its railway rates by forty per cent. This increase would cost the customers of the railway some \$22,000,000 and will be necessary to meet the Chicago wage award.

SILVER ADVANCES

LONDON, August 21.—Silver has advanced 2 1/2 pence owing to the small offerings and the ready buying up of all available by China.

DISGUISED AS POLICE

MONTREAL, August 21.—Posing as police officers, robbers paid a surprise visit to a Chinese club and got away with \$8,000.

PULP MILL FOR KETCHIKAN IS PROPOSED NOW

Harry Chimes Said to Represent London Capital Investigating, According to Ketchikan Newspaper.

KETCHIKAN, August 21.—A pulp and paper mill with a capacity of 250 tons per day is now being proposed for Ketchikan. Harry Chimes, who is said to represent London capital, has been visiting the Alaska city and the possibility points to the erection of the plant right in the city on a site now used as a baseball diamond.

According to the Ketchikan Chronicle which makes the report, Mr. Chimes says conditions at Ketchikan are highly favorable to the establishment of the project. It would cost several million dollars and he urges the people of Ketchikan to give it moral support.

WILL SUE FOR INCOME TAXES

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne Told of Port's Needs

Let Citizens at Open Meeting in Council Chamber Yesterday Afternoon; Gas Boats on Skeena Asked For, as well as Terminal Facilities

Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries, was well received at the open meeting in the city hall yesterday afternoon and the same spirit of satisfaction prevailed there as at the luncheon earlier in the afternoon. W. E. Williams aptly put it "as far as Prince Rupert is concerned, Mr. Ballantyne is the one bright star in a very drab sky, and Prince Rupert is appreciative." S. E. Parker, president of the Board of Trade, was chairman, and Mayor McClymont took his seat with Mr. Ballantyne. The gathering was called upon to place such matters before Mr. Ballantyne as seemed necessary for his consideration.

Alderman Dybhavn stated that the allowing of gas boats to fish for salmon in the Skeena district would be an advantage. He also enquired as to the proposed close season for Halibut.

The car shortage was mentioned at Ald. Dybhavn's stated he understood Mr. Ballantyne had no jurisdiction over this.

W. E. Williams stated that the greatest requirement at the present time here was for terminal facilities, bunkers and wharfrage. The time had come for assistance from Ottawa and this would be well warranted as business would naturally come here as a result. Mr. Williams also spoke in favor of gas boats on the Skeena.

LLOYD GEORGE NOT COMING YET

Rumor of the British Premier's Visit this year to Canada is Now Declared Untrue

LUCERNE, August 21.—Lloyd George hopes to visit Canada some time in 1921, if the European situation improves, is the statement given out by his secretary here. There is no truth in the rumor of his visit to the Dominion this fall.

CALGARY, August 21.—Lord Burnham, when interviewed here, regretted that the rumor regarding Lloyd George's visit to Canada was untrue, as a visit to the Dominion at this time would give the British premier relief from the terrific mental strain he is now undergoing.

PREMIER WILL VISIT RUPERT

Together with T. D. Pattullo Leaving on Rupert Monday Night—Speak at Ocean Falls

VICTORIA, August 21.—Premier John Oliver and Hon. T. D. Pattullo, Minister of Lands, are leaving here on Monday on a speaking tour to the North. Included in the itinerary will be Prince Rupert, Granby Bay, Ocean Falls, Alice Arm and points on the Grand Trunk Pacific west of Prince George.

Word was received locally this morning that Mr. Oliver and Mr. Pattullo will arrive here by the Prince Rupert on Wednesday morning and will address a public gathering in one of the theatres on Wednesday night.

General Licenses

Alex. McLennan criticized the use of purse seines on the Skeena river and also the prohibition of gill nets on the Queen Charlottes. He urged one general license for fishermen between Point Roberts and Portland Canal instead of the present district system.

G. W. Nickerson supported the general license idea and suggested that revenue be derived more from the quantity of fish caught than from a single license system. This would be fair to all and could be easily arranged.

A. J. Prudhomme spoke of the possibility of grain raising in central British Columbia and urged an elevator for Prince Rupert.

Lieut. Helmsing asked for a word of encouragement for the Navy League of Canada which he was representing in British Columbia.

Mr. Ballantyne Replies.

Mr. Ballantyne stated that he was pleased to know that gas boats were favored for the Skeena salmon fisheries. The feeling at Ottawa, he thought, was more in favor of them than against them, too.

Speaking of the halibut close season, Mr. Ballantyne stated this would not be made effective for some time yet. He understood that the United States bill had already passed congress and was awaiting the signature of the president. Even after this it would take some time to get it into international effect.

As for terminal facilities, if the need of them was proven they would soon be put in here.

Navy League Appreciated.
