## Terrace Orchards Show Great Promise

(A casual survey of the District by H. F. Pullen)

The berry season is practically over at Terrace and the apples and pears and plums are ripening fast. Some of the trees are loaded with fruit and there are evident signs of prosperity everywhere. The person who produces is the one who is always sure of a good living and the people of Terrace are producing the very finest kind of food.

Terrace is essentially a fruit and berry district, Usk and the Kitsumkalum valley are potato and vegetable lands, especially Usk where there is rather more moisture than in Terrace. It is safe to say, however, that anywhere on the river bottom lands potatoes and almost all vegetables do well. Potatoes are also on the bench lands, but they do not produce anything like as well there as on the lower lands, although in some cases the quality is better.

### Frank Clapp's

On a recent visit to Terrace, I found a number of good orchards, although I did not have time to visit a tenth of them. One of the best, from a commercial point of view, was that owned by Frank Clapp. There are ten acres in the tract, almost all planted in trees. A good many of these are of the recognized commercial varieties, such as the Wealthy apple and there are a large number of trees of each variety. They are about seven years old and from this on, if well cared for, should bring good return on the investment.

J. W. Graham has fifteen acres, but only about half of it is cultivated. He goes in for berries and fruit and potatoes. Some of his potatoes near the river bank look just as good as those grown at Usk.

### Michaud Brothers

Michaud Brothers, across the river, have rich land and they grow a good deal on the small acreage they have cleared. They are prospectors and trappers as well as ranchers, and they find time to study the plants scientifically and cross fertilize some of them and produce new varieties. The Skegna Wonder strawberry, mention of which has been made before in this paper, is a seedling, the result of a cross with the 'Magoon'. It is a fine berry and probably has a good commercial future. A good many of the plants are being raised and owners of various ranches are intending to try them out next year. Another curious berry the boys have raised is a cross between a blackberry and a raspberry, but it is not stable. The Michauds grow all their strawberries on ridges and they are very successful in raising good crops. One of the brothers is a naturalist and taxidermist and many fine specimens decorate their bachelor home.

It would be useless to try to enumerate the number of fine gardens and ranches in this favored spot. Mr. Gordon of the hotel cultivates one in connection with his other business and A. L. Kenney has the makings of a good orchard. Northward both below and above the ridge there are some fine places and flowe's ranch has been practically all put into cultivation. Mr. Gilbert's fine bungalow is in a nice setting of cultivation and in that neighborhood there are a number of good places. Alongside him is the embryo ranch owned by Rev. Dr. Grant of this city, and across the road is the Douglas Sutherland place.

### At Kitsumkalum.

A very interesting section of the district is the Kitsumkalum valley in which Prince Rupert people are particularly interested because it is there the Boehler ranch is situated. It looks fine just now and the vegetables are first rate. A good exhibit will be brought to the fall fair by Mrs. Boehler, who just now is away visiting.

Adjoining the Boehler ranch are nice little farms showing good results from cultivation. These are owned by Fred Hampton, John Wentz, Frank Nightwine and J. Haudenschild. The government is building a road to serve these settlers and they will from this time on be able to get their produce to market without difficulty.

Bee-keeping has commenced in the neighborhood and results may be expected soon. The bee expert reports this a perfect location for the bee keeper.

### Large Holdings.

There are a few places still held in large blocks such as that of

Mr. Keith of which there is only a small corner cultivated. It is not likely, however, that these can be held long. Already the Michauds are preparing to survey their places into small tracts and others will be put on the market in the near future.

If the transportation scheme with the Kitsumkalum Lake district materializes, it should materially help the Terrace merchants and enhance the value of the land.

Undoubtedly Terrace has a good future, for there is room for many times the population without going far from the town.

## FISH GOES EAST BY TIME FREIGHT

Railway Not Taking It on Passenger Trains on Account of Tourist Traffic.

Halibut sold at 13.7c and 7c at the Fish Exchange yesterday morning and six cars were taken from the arrivals by the various fish concerns. The refrigerator car supply will be in good shape until Friday when it will begin to become short again unless more cars arrive in the meantime. All fish shipments are now being made by time freight as the railroad has refused to carry them on the passenger trains on account of the heavy tourist traffic. When the tourist season is over it is likely that the passenger trains will again be carrying the fish refrigerator cars.
