## ADRIFT IN DORY FOR MANY DAYS

Adrift in the Bering Sea in a dory for five days, without food or water, with a choppy sea and a heavy wind howling, many miles from shore and with little hope of being picked up, was the trying experience endured by Dan Dennison, a cod fisherman who arrived in Ketchikan last night on his way south, says the Ketchikan Chronicle. The terrible experience left no bad effects, apparently, and Mr. Dennison said that he felt as well as ever.

As a member of the crew of the Maid of Orleans, Dennison went north some weeks ago. He left the boat in his dory, intending to be back within a short time. A heavy fog fell which shut him off from the Maid of Orleans and then a wind sent him far adrift. Had it not been for a heavy rain he would have been entirely without water, but he succeeded in securing sufficient water in this manner to quench his thirst somewhat.

After five days he was picked up by a gasboat and taken to Port Moller where he remained until he was again picked up by the steamship Catherine D. He is returning to Seattle, the home port of the Maid of Orleans.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
