RATTENBURY LANDS MANAGER IS IN THE CITY

J. G. Woods Tells of Activities of His Company and What They Are Trying to Accomplish.

J. G. Woods, vice-president and general manager of Rattenbury Lands, arrived from the east last night on his way back to Vancouver from a trip made in the interests of his company. He reports good success with the colonization schemes of the company, especially in the Bulkley and Nechako valleys where it has extensive holdings.

In telling about the workings of his concern, Mr. Wood said that they are selling their lands at prices at which they can be purchased by men who really wish to make a living at farming. The lands go at low prices and on easy terms of payment, and in the case of returned soldiers especially easy conditions are exacted, and money is provided for stocking the farms and setting the men up in business.

Not Foreign Community

The Rattenbury Lands people do not want foreign settlers. They are anxious to build up an all-British community in Central British Columbia and with this end in view have secured control of large areas of land in addition to their own on which British settlers are being placed. Mr. Rattenbury is at present in England in the interests of his concern and Mr. Wood is actively engaged in looking after new settlers at this end.

Mr. Wood says that the B.C. Land Settlement Act is having a good effect in settling up the lands and keeping the prices within reasonable bounds. He is of opinion that no one man should control a very large area of land and that is why his company is selling its holdings as fast as possible.

Average Prices.

The average price at which the Rattenbury lands are being sold is \$8 an acre and everything possible is done to encourage the man who buys so that he may make good. In order that the scheme may be a successful one the company is inducing other land owners to dispose of their holdings at reasonable prices and the result is proving most beneficial to the country at large.

MANNIX STATES HIS POSITION

Declares he is Not Hostile to England, but Asks Justice for Ireland

Archbishop Mannix gave an interview to a correspondent of the Manchester Guardian shortly after his arrival in England. The interviewer says:

The Archbishop, though very courteous, was plainly not inclined to talk much, but he replied at some length and with great frankness to the special points I put to him. His attitude in regard to Ireland he felt it unnecessary to go into. That at any rate, as he observed, there was no misconception about, and he had stated and restated it. In brief, it was that the Irish people themselves and no others had the right to decide the destiny of Ireland. What I asked for a more definite statement on was the charge that was made against him of hostility to England.

"That," he said, "is not true. I have no hostility to England or to any other country. What I desire with all my heart is peace everywhere, and particularly peace and friendship between England and Ireland, and I hope to see it. But it can only come in one way, and that is by the way of justice to Ireland."

Unfair Quotations

"I attribute this charge to the misrepresentations of English newspaper correspondents in America. I made dozens of speeches there in which I laid down this very principle, that peace between England and Ireland could be obtained by justice to Ireland and in no other way, and that I desired this peace. Not a word, so far as I can find, of this essential part of my argument was ever published here. But when I went on, as I was bound to do, to comment on the injustice done by England to Ireland, it was carefully selected passages from this part of the argument that were telegraphed."

I called the Archbishop's attention to a phrase attributed to him which attracted a good deal of attention here, in reference to the enemy between England and the United States.

Enemy with England

"There again," said Dr. Mannix, "is another illustration of the same thing. I had to point out how ill-advised, as well as wrong, was the attitude of England to Ireland because it involved not only the loss of Ireland's friendship but that of America. This country has not given America much reason to be friendly with her. To begin with, England made war on the American people on exactly the same grounds as she quarrels with Ireland, and there has been and is continually growing a trade rivalry between the two countries that might be dangerous to the peace of both. There has been war before between them, and there might be again. I do not desire hostility between them. But the way to friendship with America, as with Ireland, is by doing Ireland justice. From this argument also the correspondents have only selected the passages which suited them."

Hughes' Attacks

A reference to the attacks made on him by Mr. Hughes brought a shade of stiffness into the Archbishop's demeanor. "Mr. Hughes is going to have enough to do to look after himself," he said. "He only got into power by a majority of one or two, and now he has lost that. He is responsible for introducing a sectarian spirit into Australian politics, and I am afraid he will do it again next time."

"But does the sectarian spirit count for much in Australia?"

"Not with most people, but it has a certain limited value, and that is why he will use it."

The impression with which I took my leave of Dr. Mannix was that a very clear-headed, sincere and with the rarest涵养和风度 character and perhaps a touch of obstinacy. "I hope we shall see you in Ireland after all," I said by way of farewell. "I hope so too," he said.
