British Commonwealth Under Discussion.

Some of the Eastern papers are discussing the position of Canada in the British Commonwealth, her rights and privileges and incidentally the rights and privileges of the King. The difficulty in discussing a subject of this kind is that there is no documentary evidence for use in connection with this. Words do not mean what they purport to say. The King summons Parliament, the King dissolves parliament, the King approves things, the King declares war, the King issues a proclamation. That looks simple enough, but, as a matter of fact, the King does none of these things. The King acts officially only through his ministers, or it might be more correct to say through the prime minister, and the prime minister is responsible only to parliament elected by the people.

We sing "God Save the King," but we really mean "God preserve the state" or perhaps it would be more correct to interpret it, "With the help of God, we will preserve the state." It is all a matter of nomenclature.

People as Free As They Can Be.

People who do not live under the British flag and do not understand our elastic constitution and the manner in which it has evolved, often with blood and tears, think that we are struggling against feudalism. That is not true. There is little trace of feudalism left in the constitution of any section of the British Commonwealth (Empire, some prefer to call it). We are a free people insofar as laws can make us free.

The difficulty when we talk about freedom is to mistake a free constitution for real freedom. In Russia they have a soviet, which in theory is not a bad form of government, but as practiced there, is little more than slavery for a large part of the people. In the United States they have a more or less free form of government, but no one would claim that under it there is no injustice or that everyone has an equal chance in life. Freedom, as we have said before, is a matter of education and training. It includes education in political and social morality and no amount of legislation can make an avaricious, grasping, selfish people into a free commonwealth.

Socialist Mirage Not Possibility.

Socialists imagine that it is only the political conditions that keep some people in degradation and give others the luxuries of life. "Do away with the capitalist system," they say, and "there will be no incentive to oppression." The wage system is the only wrong. The men who work for wages are "wage slaves." Unhappily for their argument they can never point to any practical object lesson of the working out of their theory. As a matter of fact there cannot be any object lesson until man is changed, his nature improved and his tendencies curbed. We are possibly on the road toward a better condition. The present is in no sense ideal, but it is much better than has been any condition of any people in the past.

Former Capital of Alaska Holds First Election Monday

SITKA, Sept. 6.—Sitka, Alaska's oldest town, founded by the Russians in 1803 has just been incorporated and the first city election will be held Monday. The population of the city is 1,400.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson. The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.
