Cause of Unrest Autocratic Government.

Recently mention was made of the efforts to induce the Dominion Government to appeal to the country through "the holding of a general election. We also mentioned that we did not think that in the west there was any demand for an election. just now. The following is part of a communication received which bears on this subject:

"W. L. Mackenzie King has again and again insisted that one of the remedies for the unrest which now prevails throughout Canada is a return to responsible government. It is upon this ground that he demands that a general election be held so that a government and parliament which really represent the people of Canada, will take the place of a government and parliament whose mandate has expired and which no longer possesses the confidence of the country. It is the Government itself which is largely responsible for the unrest now prevailing throughout The country. Its autocratic and lawless methods tend to create unrest and discontent. It not only persists in clinging to office against the overwhelming sentiment of the country, but it uses its power in an autocratic way and practically in violation of the constitution. It expends vast sums of money without due consultation with parliament. It enters into important agreements and launches out into new policies with the same disregard to dard, for the 120th Meridian west the constitution and to the rights of parliament and the people.
